Red Cross Stamps Are Selling in Keokuk and Money Is Used in Fighting Tuberculosis Here.

WAS ORIGINATED IN WAR

Rebellion Is Responsible for First Charity Stickers From Which These Stamps Resulted.

The sale of the Red Cross stamps, which began over a week ago in such a satisfactory manner, is continuing in a way to give the committee in charge hopes of disposing of the majority of stickers which have been sent out. The system which Walter H. Clowes is introducing in the sale of seals this year is proving as big a success as it did in New York last season, when an unheard of number of stamps compared with sales of other years, were disposed of.

The money which is paid in the purchase of these little stickers is devoted to the fighting of tuberculosis right here in Keokuk, and throughout the state of Iowa. Keokuk through the Visiting Nurse association, will devote its share of the receipts from the stamps to the campaign of education against the white plague and to the actual care of cases. A similar purpose will be served by the state with its share of the proceeds.

CASE CONTINUED TILL NEXT TERM

Trial of Edward Hawk vs. F. M. Tombaugh et al Not to Be Held Until Coming Session of Federal Court.

JUDGE REED WAS HERE

Case Was to Have Been Heard This Morning, but Continuance Was Agreed Upon by Attorneys.

The case of Edward Hawk vs. F. M. Tombaugh, et al., which was to have come to trial in the federal court this morning was continued until the next term of court here. This was announced by Judge Henry T. Reed of Cresco, who came here on special assignment to hear the case. The jurors were dismissed for the term by Judge Reed.

The Hawk case was on the trial docket for this term of federal court. Judge Wade was not able to hear the case, because of the fact that he had been connected with the matter before going on the federal bench. He asked the chief justice to assign another judge for the hearing.

The jurors were excused last week to come back here today. In the meantime, it was decided yesterday by the attorneys that a continuance would be granted until the coming term of federal court.

The jurors who reported, were called into the box this morning and dismissed for the term. The court explained in the absence of the marshal that receipts would be prepared by the deputy clerk and deputy marshal and that these must be mailed to the marshal and the checks would be sent.
