NO WORD FROM HOME SINCE MAY

Louis Karwoski's Christmas 'Woud Have Been Complete if Letter Had Come From War-Swept Poland.

FATE OF HIS PARENTS

Last German Drive in Russia Made Battle Ground of Old Home and No News Has Come Through.

How would you have enjoyed Christmas yesterday if you had been several thousand miles away from your home and friends, and didn't know whether your mother and father and sisters and brothers were living or dead.

Louis Karwoski, an employe of the Hulskamp Bros. shoe factory, thought yesterday of his home in Poland that he had left six years before, and of his parents from whom he has heard nothing since last May. Several letters he has written to them have been returned to him.

For this young Pole's home was in the path of the last German invasion of Russia and he knows nothing of his relatives' fate. From the beginning of the war in August, 1914, up until May, 1915, he heard regularly from home and in each letter he was assured that all was well.

Twice the German eastern armies invaded Russia and twice they were thrown back before they reached that part of the country where the Karwoski home was situated. On the last drive, Warsaw was captured and the kaiser's grey line pushed inland until the whole of Poland was desolated by fire and sword.

Since the last drive, Louis Karwoski has heard nothing from home and an ominous silence cloaks the fate of his parents and sisters and brothers. But hope is not dead yet and he thinks that in a fair day to come he will receive glad tidings from his Polish home.

Mr. Karwoski came to America from Poland, Russia, six years ago with a large party of immigrants. It was only after many entreaties that his father gave him the money for the trip, and on the condition that he should return home after he had visited relatives in St. Louis. But when his mother bade him goodbye there was a feeling in her heart that she would never see her son again and she told him so. The prophecy may be already realized.

When Louis reached St. Louis he secured a position in a shoe factory there and wrote his father that he was going to stay in America where opportunities were greater than in Poland. The stay has extended to six years now.
