GREAT SAVING
ON FIRE TRUCK

Figures Given Out Today by John Anderson, Chief of Fire Department, Compare Truck With Horses.

IN USE SEVEN MONTHS

Estimated Saving for That Period is \$385—Will Mean \$975 for Full Year's Time.

According to figures given out today by John Anderson, chief of the fire department, the new fire truck has not only been an economical addition to the fire fighting apparatus of the city as compared with the two teams it took the place of, but is making rapid strides toward paying for itself.

The truck was placed in service on June 18, 1915, and will have been used seven months on the eighteenth of this month. The upkeep for this period of time was \$140, or approximately sixty-five cents a day.

The upkeep of the two teams would have been \$2.50 a day at the lowest, which would have made \$525 for the seven months. The difference between \$525 and \$140 is what was saved by the truck, a total of \$385.

With the same figures for a base, the annual cost to run the truck will be \$240, while that of the two teams would have been \$912.50. The saving for the year will therefore be \$675.

The \$2.50 a day cost for the two teams only takes into consideration the feed alone while other possible expenditures from bedding, wear and tear on harness, veterinary calls, etc., are not counted in so that the \$2.50 represents the lowest possible figure.

The truck has run 427 miles since it was put in commission. Actual runs to fires and back covered 195 miles. The rest was on tests and other runs not connected with fires. There is a general average of four runs a week of two miles each, making eight miles a week. Considering the cost of running the truck and that of two teams, the cost of running a mile with the former has been fifty-seven cents, while a mile with the teams cost \$2.20.
