FIVE FIRE ALARMS RESPONDED TO

Department Has Many Runs Yesterday Afternoon, Last Night and Early This Morning.

NONE WERE SERIOUS

Four Were Caused by Flues—Two Runs Were Made to the Same Place Before Blaze Was Found.

The fire department responded to five fire calls yesterday afternoon, last night and early this morning, within fourteen hours. None were serious, however, all but one being flue fires. The first alarm came from the home of W. M. Priny, 107 Blondeau street, at 8:10 o'clock yesterday afternoon. No fire could be found there after a thorough search, despite the smell of smoke.

At 4:00 o'clock another alarm was turned in from the same place. The fire had broken out between the ceiling and the roof. A defective flue was the cause. The small blaze was put out by the use of a small fire extinguisher from the truck.

A still alarm was responded to at 5:25 o'clock in the afternoon, turned in from the home of G. Bartholomew, 508 North Fifth street. This was another flue fire and there was no damage.

At 8 o'clock last evening the department answered a call from the building at Eighth and Main streets, occupied by the Leake Printing company. An employee was charging a battery on a home made auto in the rear of the building and in some manner or other the machine caught fire. The only damage was the burning of the insulation on the machine.

A flue fire in Wells school gave the department another run at 5:50 o'clock this morning.

Von Papan in Holland.
