The Bible in School. [United Press Leased Wire Service.] QUINCY, Ill., Jan. 19.—War on the teaching of the Bible in state institutions and particularly in the state normal schools for the blind, deaf and dumb at Jacksonville, was declared by the local district Verband, a branch society of the German Catholic order of Staats Verband, in annual session here last night.

The district Verband adopted resolutions asking the executive committee of the state society to take up the question. The resolution contends the teaching of the Bible in public and state schools is illegal.

SEARS IS GUEST OF DR. G. WALTER BARR

Superintendent of Keokuk Power Station is in Des Moines and Will Lecture There. Of C. A. Sears' visit to Des Moines the Register says: C. A. Sears, an American engineer who has done and is doing big things with falling water and electricity, will lecture this evening in the Highland Park college chapel. Mr. Sears has had connection with some of the most important electric plants in the country from the Pacific coast to New England. His work has been chiefly in the construction and the operating of electric plants and transmission lines coupled to water wheels. He has had a part in the construction of some of the largest water power developments in America, including that at Keokuk. When the construction work at Keokuk was done and the Mississippi river finally harnessed, Mr. Sears was made general superintendent of operation of the big water power there and has held that position ever since. He has entire charge of the operation of the world's greatest water power, its largest electric generators and the second largest transmission line. The greatest transmission line in the world runs from Big Creek, Cal., to Los Angeles. The wonderful water power development at Big Creek and also the one at Keokuk will be shown

by a large number of photographic stereoscopic slides. The lecture is under the auspices of the Highland Park college chapter of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers, and it will be attended by many engineers and electricians of Des Moines companies. Mr. Sears is known as a very entertaining platform speaker and with its many interesting pictures the lecture will be entertaining to everybody as well as its more technical parts instructive to engineers. The lecture is entirely free and the public is invited to attend by the engineering society which is bringing Mr. Sears to Des Moines.

[Copyright 1916 by The New York Evening Post.] NEW YORK, Jan. 18.—After a few hours of uncertain fluctuation of prices—with several industrial shares again showing signs of weakness—a selling movement began which was made up unmistakably of concerted professional operations for the decline. As was to be expected under all the circumstances of the week this pressure converted on the "war munitions shares," but it caused rather general weakness in nearly all parts of the lists. The day's declines were very irregular, but the day ended with the market unsettled, though with some recovery from the lowest.

As has been the case throughout the week, there was nothing in the news financially or politically to have visibly provoked the movement. On the whole, the railway shares made a good account of themselves; selling was not heavy in that quarter. The weekly gross earnings statements showed an increase, not only over 1915, but over 1914, except in the southern district.

The bond market continued to maintain its range of prices again on a substantial and well distributed business. It continued to display its now familiar indifference to the huge mass of realizing sales from Europe.
