ORDERS FIGHT ON WET SOCIAL CLUB

Attorney General Sends Out Letters to County Attorneys and Peace Officers Throughout State on This Question.

QUOTES IOWA CLUB LAW

Cosson Holds That There is No Way to Avoid Statute and That Many Organizations Are Complying.

War has been declared upon the wet social clubs of Iowa. Attorney General Cosson has sent to the county attorneys of the state as well as peace officers a letter in which he sets out the law relative to the use of liquors.

Mr. Cosson quotes section 2404 of the Iowa code relative to the use of liquor by clubs and lodges and adds an explanation of the law.

"Every person who shall, directly or indirectly, keep or maintain, by himself or by associating or combining with others, or who shall in any manner aid, assist or abet in keeping or maintaining any club room or other place in which intoxicating liquors are received or kept for the purpose of use, gift, barter or sale, or for distribution or division among the members of any club or association by any means whatever, and every person who shall use, barter, sell or give away, or assist or abet another in bartering, selling or giving away any intoxicating liquors so received or kept, shall be punished by a fine of not less than one hundred dollars, or by imprisonment in the county jail not less than thirty days nor more than six months."

"You will notice that the language is broad enough to prohibit every person keeping or maintaining intoxicating liquors either by himself or by associating with others for the purpose of use as well as barter, sale, distribution or division."

"In my opinion there is no legal way by which intoxicating liquors may be kept at any club for the use of the members individually, and from the reports coming to this department the clubs generally over the state are eliminating all intoxicating liquors."

APPEAL TO POPE TO REMOVE BODIES Lusitania Victims are Buried in Little Irish Graveyard and Not Allowed to be Touched.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] LONDON, Jan. 20.—Pope Benedict may be appealed to, it was learned today, to give his consent to the removal of bodies of several American victims of the Lusitania from a lonely burial ground near Queenstown.

The urban district council at Queenstown refused the request for exhumation several weeks ago after identification had been established by means of photographs. Representatives for the American petitioners have discovered that the late Pope Plus gave permission for removal of the body of an American woman from a Catholic burial ground near Dublin two years ago. They plan to cite this case to the present pope.

Relatives of Mrs. G. A. Anderson of Pittsburgh, wife of a mining engineer, of Miss Elizabeth Secome of Concord, Mass., and of a Mrs. Finck of Chicago, are making energetic efforts to have the district council's decision overturned. The bodies of the three women lie close together in the lonely graveyard in cheap pine boxes that threaten to fall to pieces within a few months.
