## PRAYER LEADERS FOR CAMPAIGN

Devotional Committee for Scoville Meetings Namees Seventy-five as Sectional Chairmen.

## INSTRUCTIONS ARE SENT

Will Have Charge of Cottage Prayer Meetings to Prepare for Evangelistic Services Here Next Month.

At the first meeting of the devotional committee of the Scoville campaign, the district superintendents, Messrs. VanAusdall, Crown, Inman and Newell, with Rev. F. B. McAllister as their chairman, nominated about seventy-five of the strongest Christian women of the city to be the devotional committee. It is being sent, as well, instructions as to their individual tasks. The city has been divided into four great sections and over each one of these is a district superintendent. Then, in turn, each one of these districts is divided into sections two blocks each way. Thus the city is divided into about a hundred small sections in which there are to be two prayer services a week at the homes of the people of those sections. The work of these sectional chairmen will largely be to have their assistants find homes in their section where prayer meetings may be held.

Beginning with the first evening of February, Tuesday night, meetings will be held every Tuesday and Thursday evenings until the campaign begins. After the meetings start, the prayer services will be held in the morning from 10 to 10:30. The sectional chairmen may have leaders for these cottage services, though it is not necessary. The time is largely to be spent in prayer, singing and testing. Cards are being printed which will be hung in the windows of the homes where use meetings are to be held, and if this work is at all like other cities where Scoville has been, great sectional enthusiasm is shown, and in these meetings some conversions have been known.

The chairman should have two assistants to canvass their section immediately to ascertain the homes where meetings may be held, in some homes meetings may be held several times, then when the opening meeting begins everything will be under way. It will be also the work of the sectional leader to advertise in whatever way she can the meetings of the neighborhood and to arouse the local spirit.
