the code of Iowa, as amended, or in violation of any law restricting the incurring of indebtedness or the issuance of warrants; and Whereas, none of said indebtedness was incurred, and none of said warrants were issued, for road or highway purposes, or for the purchase of real estate, or for the purchase or construction of any building, or for bridge purposes; and Whereas, none of said indebtedness or warrants has ever been adjudicated to be invalid; and no litigation is pending, prayed, or threatened involving the validity of any of said indebtedness or warrants; and said indebtedness thus evidenced, is a legal, valid, binding, and general obligation of said county, and of the entire county, chargeable upon all the taxable property therein; and Whereas, it is deemed to be the best interest of said county to fund said outstanding indebtedness, thus evidenced, to the amount of \$91,000, and all of said indebtedness, is of such character that it can legally be funded; and Whereas, the amount, nature, and condition of the indebtedness of said county now is and was on the first day of September, 1915, including the aforesaid indebtedness, evidenced as aforesaid, and was at the time of the contracting and of the incurring and of the presentation and of the allowing of each item of said indebtedness, including such item, and at the time of issuance of each of said warrants, including such warrant, such that according to the last previous state and county tax lists no portion of said county now is, or was at any of said times, chargeable with taxation (either levied or necessary afterwards to be levied) to pay county indebtedness exceeding the limit of one and one-quarter per centum of the actual value of the taxable property within such portion of said county, and such that the total indebtedness of said county does not, and did not at any of the aforesaid times, exceed the constitutional or statutory limits.
