# U. C. T.'S ASK FOR SEVERAL CHANGES

Petition Council for Another Conductor on Park-Cemetery Line—  
Change In Depot  
Schedule.

## MEETING ON SATURDAY

Will be Discussed by All Parties Concerned—Manager J. P. Ingle Explains Situation.

U. C. T. council No. 400 of Keokuk has petitioned the city council for changes in the street car service. The council will meet with a committee from the U. C. T.'s and J. P. Ingle, manager of the Keokuk Electric company, on Saturday morning at 9:00 o'clock to talk the matter over.

The three most important things are an improvement in the schedule of the depot car, a conductor on the full park-cemetery run instead of between the switches, and a toilet room on the interurban car to Warsaw.

In an interview today, Manager Ingle of the Keokuk Electric company explained some points in connection with the three. Some months ago the company removed one conductor from the park-cemetery line where formerly there had been two.

"This was a necessary measure of economy," Mr. Ingle said. "Our receipts from the main line last year fell considerably below those of the year before, and in fact during the several years there has been a decrease each year. It was absolutely necessary that economy be introduced and the company believed that it would be better to take off one conductor than to cut the service to twenty minutes or take some other step that would prove disagreeable."

"The plan being used here has been used with success in many other cities throughout the United States. In fact, many have been forced to do it because of falling revenue. The matter of arranging a better schedule for the depot car is an almost impossible task. We have tried all ways and find that the one we are using now is the best of all.

At the present time we meet all incoming trains. If the car ran on a regular schedule, whenever a train was late, the car would have to go off and leave it. As it is, the depot car does not pay expenses. In the matter of a toilet room on the interurban car, this appears to be unnecessary because of the fact that there are facilities at both the Hamilton and Warsaw stations but thirty-five minutes apart. Then there is a chance that if the change were made it would prove a nuisance.

# ARRESTS ARE CUT IN HALF

Only Twenty-four in January, 1916, as Compared With Fifty-four in January Last Year.

## THE POLICE STATISTICS

Number of Arrests Because of Intoxication Greatly Cut This Year—  
Fewer Sleepers at the Jail.

The arrests made by the police department in January of this year for all causes were fewer by half than for January, 1915, and arrests for intoxication nearly one-third as few.

During the past month the city jail has been deserted for days at a time and the police have had an unusually light month. There have been fewer sleepers at the station this month than ever before, also, despite the fact that this winter has proven to be one of the hardest in years. Last night there were eight sleepers at the station, the largest number so far this winter.

Last winter during the coldest nights the usual number was between fifteen and twenty. The supposition is that more people are at work this winter than last.

Following are some police statistics of 1915 and 1916:

Number of arrests in January, 1915, 52; number of arrests in January, 1916, 24.  
Number of arrests in January, 1916, for intoxication, 23; in January, 1915, 9.  
Number of crimes committed by intoxicated persons in January, 1915, 6; in January, 1916, 4.

## WIFE OF AUTHOR SUES FOR DIVORCE

Richard Washburn Child Is Made Defendant in Suit Filed in New York Court.

According to a New York paper, Richard Washburn Child, the author, has sued for a divorce in the supreme court yesterday by Elizabeth Scott Child. No information as to the particulars of the action could be learned, the papers being sealed. Mr. Child is 34 years old. He was graduated from Harvard in 1903 and was admitted to the bar in 1906. According to "Who's Who," he married Mary Elizabeth Scott in 1904.

Mr. Child has been a frequent contributor to the various magazines, and is the author of several books. He has a home at Cohasset, Mass.
