GEORGE HENZEL DIED ON FRIDAY

Former Proprietor and Editor of the Keokuk Post-Register, Succumbs to Stroke.

IN KEOKUK 25 YEARS

Came Here From St. Louis, Where He Settled After Coming to the United States From Germany.

George Henzel, a quarter-century resident of Keokuk and former editor of the Post-Register, once a well-known German newspaper published in this city, passed away suddenly at his home, 1419 Concert street at 9:00 o'clock Friday night.

He continued to own and operate the Post-Register until about six or seven years ago, when it was disposed of to other parties and later discontinued.

The family moved to Keokuk from St. Louis. Mr. Henzel retired from business about six years ago because of ill health.

ABOUT TIME FOR MEXICAN TROUBLES

Commander in Chief of Carranza's Army is Said to Have Joined the Rebels.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] EL PASO, Texas, Feb. 5.—Unconfirmed rumors that General Alvo Obregon, commander in chief of the Carranza army, has split with the defecting government, were contained in advices from Mexico tonight.

The break between Obregon and Carranza was reported to have taken place early in the week. Mexican refugees here said.

Obregon was rumored to have allied himself with the rebels who have conquered the state of Oaxaca. Neither confirmation nor denial of the report could be obtained from the Carranza officials here.

Anti-Carranza forces attacked and captured Parral, Chihuahua, according to advices received in mining circles. All Americans had escaped, the messages stated. The fighting was described as "severe."

General Arguedo's rebels were supposed to have comprised the attacking party.

There was no confirmation of the report that Francisco Villa was surrounded. On the contrary, General Arturo Rodriguez, who surrendered with thirty Villista followers at Casas Grandes, said the bandit leader was at San Buenaventura, thirty miles from Casas Grandes, and made no mention of his being surrounded.

Rodriguez and his men were granted amnesty, according to General Gabriel Martinez, Carranza commandant in Juarez. Villa was said to have only sixty loyal followers with him.

COURT BUSY WITH PROBATE MATTERS

Three Wills Are Probated Yesterday and One is Opened and Read Before Session Adjourns.

MATLESS WILL IS ONE

Mellwain Will is Another One Probated—Captain Decker's Will Opened and Read.

Three wills were admitted to probate in the district court yesterday morning. They were those of the late Alfred E. Matless, Rev. R. C. Mellwain and Kaika Carlson.

The will of Dr. Mellwain provides for the bequests to Harvard University, and other bequests, as mentioned in The Gate City last Monday. William Timberman and James C. Davis will act as executors of the will.

Matless Will Probated.

In the will of the late Alfred E. Matless, the homestead is bequeathed to his wife. To each of his nieces, Lucille and Dorothy Knights, the sum of \$1,000 is left. Two thousand dollars is left to each of his sisters, Kate M. Matless and Mrs. Mabel C. Knights.

Leonard Matless, Alfred G. Matless and James Matless are named as trustees to take care of the remainder of the property. They are to have the sole power in handling this property and are to look after it in the same manner in which Mr. Matless did in his lifetime.

Decker Will is Read.

The will of the late A. C. Decker was opened and publicly read yesterday morning. The will provides that the widow shall receive the use of the homestead for life. The division of the remainder of the property is on the basis of one-third to the widow and two-thirds to the three children of Captain Decker, Charles, Delos and Mrs. Coulson.

Reynolds is Better.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] LOS ANGELES, Feb. 5.—"Much better" was the bulletin issued tonight by physicians attending George M. Reynolds, president of the Continental and Commercial bank of Chicago, who is very ill with a complication of maladies.

Preparations are being made at the Alexandria hotel for the reception of Reynolds' wife, son and daughter-in-law, who are enroute here from Chicago.

Ryndam Struck a Mine.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] NEW YORK, Feb. 5.—Passengers arriving on the White Star line ship today confirmed the report that the Holland-American liner Ryndam struck a mine off the mouth of the Thames, January 18 and said that the British censor allowed that fact to be published in England, though cable dispatches to the United States contained no mention of the nature of the accident.

The first official report said the mine had been placed by the Germans. A coroner's jury at Graves End reported in its findings that the evidence did not disclose whether it was an enemy mine.

The Ryndam was still at Graves End undergoing repairs when the Baltic sailed January 26.

Fog Station Burned.
