—There seems to have been a misinterpretation of the item in last night's Gate City concerning the purchase of a fire truck at Quincy. The item meant that the engine was similar only in respect to its make, to the Keokuk machine, both of them being American LaFrance.

The Quincy engine is known as a hoisting engine and is for use only to increase pressure, while the Keokuk engine will lift water. The Quincy engine can throw 300 gallons while the truck here throws 800 to 1,000 gallons. The weight of the Keokuk fire truck is 5 1/2 tons, while the Quincy engine weighs only 6,800 pounds.

LINCOLN'S LETTER TO COL. H. B. BLOOD

This Much Cherished Epistle Written by President at Gettysburg Will be Displayed.

HE ASKS FOR A HORSE

Friend Needed Mount for Parade and the President Wrote to Captain Blood for the Animal.

A letter signed by Abraham Lincoln and addressed to Col. H. B. Blood, which is among the most cherished possessions of Colonel Blood will be displayed tomorrow in the window of the Keokuk National bank. The letter was signed in November 19, 1863, at the time that President Lincoln was at Gettysburg to deliver his famous address at the dedication of the cemetery there.

The letter is framed, and is written on a piece of scrap note-paper. It was given to Colonel Blood, who was at that time a captain in the quartermaster department of the army of the Potomac. He was one of the officers who had been left on duty at Gettysburg in the months following the great battle there.

The note was addressed to Colonel Blood by the president in behalf of a friend. The note reads:
Captain Blood:—
Furnish one horse for bearer.
A. Lincoln.

Nov. 19, 1863.

The friend had been asked to ride in the procession, but had declined, saying that he did not have a mount. The president then wrote the note to the quartermaster's department, addressing it to Captain Blood and demanding the horse.


—Quincy is to have a revival in October with Bob Jones, who was wanted here last fall, in charge. The Herald says: Rev. L. W. Bingham, pastor of the Luther Memorial church, and acting chairman of the evangelistic committee of the church federation, this morning received Evangelist Bob Jones' acceptance of the proposition made him by the council of the Quincy Federation of Churches last Saturday through his business manager, G. H. Meinard. Mr. Jones accepted the proposition upon the recommendation of Mr. Meinard, and it is now up to the Quincy churches to make good their part of the proposition. Mr. Jones writes that he hopes that the proposition will be met with enthusiasm by the individual churches. A meeting of the council of the federation will be held on the last Monday of February and the representatives of each church will then take the proposition back to their respective churches for action. If all accept it, Bob Jones will give Quincy the second date in October, which falls in the last week of that month and just one week before the presidential campaign comes to a close.
