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cut court. Soon after Dred was sold to Sanford of New York City. Judgment was pronounced March 1857, against Dred. But the judges went on to decide generally, denying the legal existence of the African race as persons under the law; a denial of the supreme control of congress over the territories, and a denial of the constitutionality of the Missouri compromise.

The gentlemen, G. E. Kopp, Jr., Postmaster Harkrader, A. Derksen, Captain Barber, Messrs. Kessler and Hosford and Judge Crawford heartily agreed that the United States should be a model country. The opinion prevailed that our endeavor should be to promote good citizenship. Citizenship rests on an ideal which only can be felt. We must believe in the ideals of the nation. We can grow in this belief by studying the lives of great American citizens.

These meetings are a salt of the community, since their purpose is not to promote the cause of any religion, political or local party, or of any particular race. Was Resident of Keokuk for a Period of Sixty-two Years—Body to be Brought to Keokuk.

WILL ARRIVE SATURDAY

Five Children Survive, Among Them J. A. Pollard of This City—Decedent Born in Pennsylvania.

Mrs. Catherine M. Pollard, formerly a resident of Keokuk for a period of sixty-two years, died at the home of a daughter at Alton, Ill., at 8:00 o'clock last night from old age.

The body will be brought to Keokuk for burial and will arrive here on Saturday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock.

J. A. Pollard of this city, is a son of the decedent. The other surviving children are Mrs. Dora Hinson, Revere, Mo.; Mrs. Fanny Carter, St. Louis, Mo.; Thomas Pollard, Farmington, Iowa; and Mrs. Minnie Lindley, Alton, Ill. Two children, Mrs. Ida Chenoweth and Mary Pollard, are dead. There are also grandchildren and great-grandchildren living.

Mrs. Pollard's maiden name was Catherine May Cadwallader and she was born in Pennsylvania on May 27, 1826. She was married to Thomas J. Pollard at Selma, Mo., on October 26, 1843. Mr. and Mrs. Pollard located in Keokuk in the year 1848.

After Mr. Pollard's death in 1910, his widow went to Alton to live after a residence here of sixty-two years. During those many years she made hosts of friends here and all will learn with sincere regret of her death.
