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Illinois Man Gets in Bad With Quarantine Law and Pig in Freight Car.

OMAHA, Neb., Feb. 19.—Never again when he moves from one state to another will H. B. Rogers attempt to secure a railroad pass for himself on the strength of having a pig in the car with his household effects, and that it is necessary for him to go along to feed and water the animal.

Rogers lived near Sheffield, Ill., on the line of the Rock Island. He purchased land out in Wyoming and was moving there, going early so to be there and start spring work. His new location is along the Union Pacific.

Both the Rock Island and the Union Pacific have rules that permit the issuance of a pass to one person if that person goes along with household movables, providing there is live stock in the car containing the goods.

Rogers got his car loaded and everything went well until it reached Council Bluffs, where the discovery was made that the shipment came from Illinois territory that was quarantined against both Iowa and Nebraska, so far as hogs were concerned.

At Council Bluffs the Union Pacific would not receive the Rogers car and bring it into Nebraska so long as it contained the pig. The quarantine rules prevented anything of the kind, and a violation would subject the road to a fine of something like \$1,000 and a jail sentence for the official passing the way bill.

Rogers hit upon the idea of killing his pig and burying it in Iowa. The Iowa stock inspectors held that this would be a violation of the law that provides for neither live nor dead animals coming from quarantined territory shall remain within the limits of the state.

Emigrant rates do not apply from Council Bluffs into Illinois, and as a result Rogers had to pay the regular rate and because there was live stock in the car, he had to go along. However, he did not get a pass, as there is no provision of law covering such contingencies.

After he gets back to Illinois and disposes of his pig, if Rogers still desires to come west, he will have to pay regular passenger rates, and if he brings his household goods, the customary rate will be applied to them. The upshot of the whole matter up to this time has been that the lone pig has made Rogers' move cost him close to \$100 and he is just where he started.

DEPARTMENT OUT FOR SMALL BLAZE

Portion of Floor of Keokuk Lunch Club was on Fire, but was Extinguished.

The fire department was called to the Keokuk Lunch club on Main street between Fifth and Sixth yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock. The floor under the big range had become ignited. It was necessary to chop a hole in the floor before the fire could be reached. It was extinguished with a couple of hand extinguishers, as soon as the firemen could get at it. There was not sufficient air space between the range and floor and the wood caught fire.
