## RESISTANCES IN BOY CASES FILED

Counsel for Parents of Harry Ealey and Arlo Wilson Ask for Trial on Revoking of Parole.

## WANTS CASES MOVED

Petition States That Boys Have Not Violated Parole Given Last Year—B. E. Fuller Pleads Not Guilty.

Another chapter was begun in the Arlo Wilson-Harry Ealey cases today. Arrangements were complete for sending of the boys to the state industrial school at Eldora today, but counsel for the parents of the boys filed a resistance to the revoking of the parole and asked for trial by jury and an appeal of the case to the district court.

A paper was filed for each of the boys. In one entitled J. E. Wilson, complainant, vs. Arlo Wilson, defendant, it is declared that on September 21, 1914, Arlo had been declared habitually vagrant, disorderly and incorrigible in an information filed by his father, J. E. Wilson, and found guilty, without having the benefit of counsel. He was then paroled to the custody of his father.

The defendant further alleges that he had not violated any of the conditions of the parole and that it had been brought to his knowledge that persons were seeking to have the parole revoked and the defendant sent to Eldora, Iowa.

The petition goes on to state that this is without cause or justification and asks a hearing upon the revocation of the parole and trial by jury in the superior court upon the same. The case is also appealed to the district court.

In the case of Harry Ealey, practically the same resistance has been filed. It is declared that on May 24, 1914, he was declared vagrant and disobedient in an information filed by his mother, Mrs. Alice Beard; was found guilty and paroled back to his mother. It is stated that the parole was not broken and a trial and appeal is asked.

**Other Cases.**  
B. E. Fuller pleaded not guilty in the superior court this morning to the charge of driving his automobile across the sidewalk space at Nineteenth and Reid streets on February 29. He told the court that he had two passengers in the bus, and got stuck in a rut and that it was necessary to cut across to get out of it.

The matter has been taken up with the city council and it is likely that a barricade will be erected on that corner.  
Louis Corbelle pleaded not guilty this morning to a charge of assault and battery preferred against him by J. S. Moore.

Searcy, who was pastor of a colored church here several years ago, figures in the following from Ottumwa: Mrs. Mary Talbot, who was 118 years of age on Christmas day, was received into membership in the African M. E. church at the home of her grandson, E. T. Jackson, here last night. Rev. W. A. Searcy, pastor of the church, received the aged colored woman into the Methodist fold. Mrs. Talbot was a slave in the family of Daniel Boone.

—Nomination petitions of Curtis M. Hart, democratic candidate for clerk of the district court are being circulated.

—Regular meeting of Pukechuck encampment No. 7, I. O. O. F., at Odd Fellows hall at 8 o'clock tonight. Visiting brethren fraternally invited to attend.

—Spring must be on the way, in spite of the clawing of the March lion. The grocer's windows blossomed forth today with huge boxes of flower and vegetable seeds.

—Regular meeting of Keokuk lodge, No. 106, B. P. O. E., tonight at 8 o'clock, Elks' hall, Sixth and Blon dean streets. Visitors invited. Initiation and election of officers.

—The Carriage papers say: A petition has been filed with the clerk of the circuit court by Mack & Mack, Hartzell & Cavanaugh on behalf of the village of Pontoosuc that an injunction be issued against the Mississippi River Power company that they be forever restrained from operating the dam in a way that will overflow all or any part of the streets of Pontoosuc.

—The board of supervisors is meeting at the court house at Fort Madison today for the purpose of determining what bridges will be constructed in the county this year. There are many bridges which need rebuilding while there are also many points in need of bridges. It will be the duty of the board to determine as to the urgency in the erection of the different bridges and the number to be constructed within the appropriations made for year.

—The legal department of the city council has called attention to the fact that all voters who didn't vote at the last general election, which was on Nov. 3, 1914, must register. If you didn't register today, another chance will be given tomorrow. The registration booths will be open on March 11 also, two days before the election. Voters who happened to be out of town during the three days of registration, or who can show good cause, will be allowed to register on the day of election.

—The Iowa Bankers' association reports that forty fifty dollar bills are in circulation in Iowa. Most of these have been made by splitting a genuine fifty dollar bill and a five or ten dollar bill, and thus making two fifty dollar bills, one side of which is half of the genuine fifty and the other side the smaller bill raised to fifty. The parties who are doing this work are very skillful in pasting figures and letters on the raised bills and they seem to have little trouble in passing them. A number of tens have been raised to twenties, and there are some bills with the figures cut off to be used in raising other bills.

—Quincy Herald: Gem City lodge Loyol Order of Moose, had a business meeting at the Moose hall last night, with an average attendance. One candidate for membership was initiated, and one application accepted. Final arrangements were also made for the annual Moose excursion on the steamer G. W. Hill of the Wisberd line, to Keokuk and return, Sunday, May 7. It will probably be the first excursion of the season, at any rate the first Sunday trip on the Hill, and also the first all-day river outing on any boat. The Moose are to have their tickets printed soon to begin the advance sale in March. They expect to have a big crowd, providing the weather conditions are favorable. At the next meeting, Tuesday, March 7, there will be initiation and also nomination of officers. The annual election will be the principal business for the meeting (March 7)
