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THOUSANDS OF ANGRY MEXICANS

Funston. "Of course he would first secure the consent of the local Mexican military commander, as the road is now under the control of the Mexican war department.

As I understand it, the road is in fair condition for operation between Casas Grandes and the Cumbre tunnel. The explosion in the tunnel which wrecked it about a year ago has never been repaired. A switch back is now operating about the tunnel and three cars at a time can be handled over it."

Emphasis was laid upon the need of speed in the army operations south of Casas Grandes by officers at the post, and it was pointed out that the road ran directly into the territory in which Pershing would be most likely to want troops in a hurry.

Without direct word from Casas Grandes for over thirty-six hours, General Funston today wireless General Pershing to get into immediate touch with him and report fully as to the situation about Casas Grandes.

He also asked for definite information relating to Lieutenant Gorrell, the missing aviator, and for confirmation that Aviator Lieut. R. H. Willis had reported after an absence of three days.



Colo., and forced to crowd into the remainder of the train when railroad officials received a hurry order for additional cars for the troops. The yards at Pueblo, Denver, Colorado Springs and Cheyenne were emptied of available passenger coaches.

The first detachment passed through Denver early today. Col. W. G. Penrose is in command of the regiment consisting of 1,700 men.

Cannot be Trusted. EL PASO, Texas, March 23.—General Luis Herrera, who is reported to have gone over to Villa with 2,000 soldiers, has long been known on the border as the "chameleon" because he has so frequently jumped from one side to another in revolutions.

Herrera's home is in Parral, Chihuahua, a mining town. He is a brother of General Maclovio Herrera, a dashing Carranza commander who was shot and killed by mistake by one of his own men a year ago.

Though Luis Herrera and Villa quarrelled frequently in the Carranza-Villa campaign against Huerta, Herrera went over to Villa when the latter broke with Carranza. After fighting Carranza for several months, he changed sides again and deserted Villa.

Herrera is known for his hatred of "gringos." About a year ago he threatened to confiscate \$100,000,000 worth of foreign mining properties.

All Ready to Explode. SAN ANTONIO, Texas, March 23.—Northern Mexico today is a powder magazine with a fire burning on all sides of it.

From Brownsville to the California line, fear of uprisings by Carranza troops against American border towns has been suddenly revived, following the reported revolt of the force under General Luis Herrera, former Carranza commander, who is said to have cast his lot with Villa yesterday and declared war on the U. S. This report, together with rumors of disaffection at Juarez, reached army headquarters at El Paso. While no official report has yet been made to General Funston, the situation is being frankly faced at Fort Sam Houston and additional troops are being ordered to protect border points where the danger is most evident.

The third battalion of the Fifth cavalry, now speeding to Columbus, will be immediately distributed along the border, and a portion of the Twenty-fourth infantry, not required for protection of General Pershing's line of communication, will be utilized for additional border patrol.

The Twenty-fourth is expected to reach Columbus late today. One of the most significant changes in disposition of troops, confirmed today, was the sending of the Fourth artillery from Mercedes to Brownsville, "where it will be better off."

There are already more than 5,000 United States soldiers in the Brownsville district, but Matamoros, a Mexican city across the river, is a hot bed of Villista sentiment.

At General Funston's headquarters, it was stated that proper precautions are being taken to guarantee Pershing's line of communication between Columbus and Casas Grandes from possible attack by revolting Carranzistas.

General Funston today refused either to confirm or deny the reported engagement between a detachment of the Seventh cavalry and a Villista force, said to have occurred eighty miles southeast of Casas Grandes. According to the report, emanating from El Paso, the casualties were two Americans and eighty-two Mexicans.

"So far," said General Funston, "I have received no word from General Pershing of any engagement. You must remember, however, that our wireless is working very uncertainly and it is very possible for news of such a skirmish to get back to the border over Mexican telegraph wires long before the news reaches me."

General Funston would not discuss the reported censorship at El Paso. Bell Army headquarters insisted that General Bell had made no report of the issuance of such an order. At the same time staff officers admitted that such a step would not be at all improbable under existing circumstances. They refused to explain what was meant by "existing circumstances."

fall a victim to Villista bullets, or is still alive, perhaps lying injured with a disabled machine somewhere in the vast vacant spaces of the desolate Mexican desert country is a question causing General Funston and headquarters officers great uneasiness.

Gorrell was last seen late Monday afternoon flying over Colon, Juarez. The work of the first American aero squad operating with General Pershing's column has been one of the greatest disappointments so far encountered in the Mexican campaign. No branch of the military service was expected to be of so much value in the work of running down the bandit leader, and none has met with so many reverses. Within less than three days following its departure from Columbus for the front, March 19, fifty per cent of the squadron's strength was put out of commission. Three of the eight machines were disabled through the breakage of vital parts. A fourth operated by Lieutenant Gorrell is missing.

General Funston today referred to the work of the machines comprising the first aero squadron as "very poor." The altitude of the Casas Grandes region, five thousand feet, is not considered sufficient to explain the poor showing. Army officers here point out that Italian and Austrian aviators are operating at much greater altitudes along the Italian front.
