VILLA LOSES SOME MEN IN BATTLE

shown the soldiers of the defacto government and you will see the answer. They are afraid.

In Agua Prieta 300 Carranza troops were drilling. Their colonel, a large man in a white duck suit, was the only individual with the appearance of a soldier. One of the officers, a captain, wore gold braid. The remainder of the "staff" were indistinguishable from the privates.

The troops were mostly Mayo Indians. In the tattered gray green uniforms provided them, they did not look like the robust, well-fed, carefully groomed American soldier here in Camp Douglas. A large number of the Carranzistas were marked by smallpox. Their eyes were not clear. Stubby, discolored teeth and rickety limbs were noticeable. Few wore anything more than trousers and jumpers. Most of them were barefoot or wore worn-out sandals. Lately many of the sandals have been made from discarded automobile tires.

"Why do you fight?" was asked several. "A comer," (to eat) was the invariable reply.

The most spirited of the "soldados" were the "muchachos" (boys). Over a score appeared to be no more than thirteen years of age. Some wore inches shorter than the heavy, rusted rifles they shouldered. These are the soldiers who Villistas claim are afraid of their hunted chief.

No Shots Fired. SAN ANTONIO, Texas, March 24.—If a single shot has been fired at American soldiers by hostile Mexicans since General Pershing's expedition crossed the border nine days ago, General Funston, directing the hunt from Fort Sam Houston, has not been informed of it.

The request made yesterday by General Funston for a full report from General Pershing on the American operations south of Casas Grandes had not resulted early today in definite news. No confirmation of the report of surrounding Villa at El Oso by a mixed force of Americans and Carranzistas has been received at army headquarters.

While there is direct conflict in reports received by General Funston concerning alleged revolt by Gen. Luis Herrera, former Carranza commander in Chihuahua, it was stated at headquarters today that latest information indicated Herrera is not in arms against the U. S. Full reports from Chihuahua City entirely clear.

Amateur Wireless Stations. SAN ANTONIO, Texas, March 24.—Amateur wireless stations along the border will be dismantled by the government if interference on the part of the amateurs with the government wireless signals interrupting communication with General Pershing continues. Twenty-five small stations about San Antonio already have been dismantled by government authorities.

Gorrell Turns Up. COLUMBUS, N. M., March 24.—After being lost in the desert and foodless for twenty-four hours, Lieut. Edgar S. Gorrell was safe at Casas Grandes today. Lieut. J. L. Parkinson, commanding a motor truck train bound for the American expedition's base in Mexico, found Gorrell seated in the shade of his biplane with hope almost abandoned. His aeroplane's leaky gas tank forced Gorrell to descend in an uninhabited sandy stretch without vegetation. He made his way on foot to a wagon trail and left a note on a stick of wood which his rescuers came upon.

After repairing the tank and taking on a supply of gasoline from the motor supply train, Gorrell waved his hand and soared away to Casas Grandes. He was greeted as one abandoned as dead by other members of the aero squadron who had vainly searched the desert on flights for him.

Herrera Not Disloyal. WASHINGTON, March 24.—General Luis Herrera, hitherto reported as disloyal to Carranza and aligned with Villa, is loyal to the defacto government head, is still military commander at Chihuahua City, and is not heading any revolt, according to a state department message from Consul Letcher at Chihuahua City today.

Coming direct from the scene of Herrera's reported defection, and signed by the United States consul, administration officials were inclined to take the denial at its face value, in spite of the many rumors to the contrary from the border. War department officials frankly admitted they had, up to this time, feared the original report concerning Herrera might be true.

The war department later today received the following message from General Funston, confirming the Letcher dispatch: "General Herrera, in a telegram to General Gavra (Juarez), strongly denies all reports that he has gone over to Villa.

"General Gutierrez, governor of Chihuahua, in a letter to General Gavra also strongly denies that Herrera has gone over to Villa."

CITIES' FINANCES ARE IN BAD SHAPE

Revenue Formerly Derived From Saloon Licenses Is Being Missed all Over State, Report Shows.

DEFICITS ARE COMMON

Many Plans Being Devised to Raise Money to Meet Annual Expenditures in Various Cities.

Cities of Iowa which formerly enjoyed a good revenue from the saloons, are now engaged in a struggle to make their expenditures fit their income.

From the reports of city auditors, but few of the cities so far have solved fully the question of maintenance on reduced revenue. Appropriation ordinances will be passed in all cities this month.

According to the Register and Leader the efforts being made to readjust finances owing to loss of saloon revenue follow:

People Donate \$15,000. Ottumwa—\$15,000 raised by public subscription for current year for pay of police and firemen. Proposed to raise license on saloons, industries and automobiles to licensed business.

Cedar Rapids—Proposed to reduce expenses in all departments. No plans yet to increase revenue. Davenport—Adjustment made without need of increase in tax levy. Added ten men to fire department.

Burlington—Reduced police department. Cut fire department. Still have deficit.

State Legislative Help. Marshalltown—Officials hope for legislation to enable cities to raise more money for general fund, or permit transfers from other funds as needs require. Keokuk—Reduced police department.

Council Bluffs—Studying methods of reducing expenses. Investigating possible ways of increasing revenue. No satisfactory plan yet.

Port Dodge—Officials say they may have to increase tax levies where possible. Reduction in appropriations for 1916 being considered.

Waterloo—Officers hope for legislation to permit raising more revenue for general fund.

Sioux City Stumped. Sioux City—Trying to work out plan to meet deficit. No general plan yet adopted for increasing revenue.

Des Moines—Raised certain licenses. Deficit growing nevertheless, report says.

The cities affected by the closing of saloons are exchanging ideas on how to meet the cramped financial situation. It appears likely that whatever plan works in one city, will be tried out in the others also. All of the affected cities report they are trying to cut expenses. Sioux City is not only facing decreased revenue, but it also in the future must pay each member of the city council \$500 a year additional salary, by reason of the increase in population shown by the 1915 census. It is said.
