### AUXILIARY GIVES PROGRAM MONDAY

Students Belonging to Monday Music Club Will Give Their Annual Recital Before Club Members.

### SYMPHONY IS FEATURE

Toy Orchestra, Directed by Mrs. Hugh J. Robertson, Will be the Chief Feature of the Event.

The regular Monday Music club program will be given in the Y. W. C. A. auditorium tomorrow evening, beginning promptly at 8 o'clock. It will be the annual recital given by the students' auxiliary before the members of the music club.

These programs are always peculiarly interesting and full of surprises to those who do not attend the regular meetings of the auxiliary and are therefore unaware of some of the very good work that is being done in this department of the club.

There will be many good numbers and among them one novelty which merits some explanation. This will be the presentation of Haydn's "Toy Symphony," composed in 1783. It was conceived, so the story runs, while the composer was at a fair, where tin whistles, trumpets, drums and other toy instruments were all together making a noisy pandemonium.

It occurred to Haydn that this madening discord could be converted into harmony and order brought out of chaos, could each toy instrument be given its proper pitch and position. The result was the "Toy" or "Kinder" symphony, which has been many times imitated.

It is written in C major and has parts for cuckoo pipes, a quail call, a nightingale, trumpet, drum, triangle, bill-tree, xylophone, violin, and piano (arranged for four hands). Its rendition takes about fifteen minutes.

The instruments, properly attuned, were bought in Chicago and the first "Toy Symphony" ever given in Keokuk was presented at one of the meetings of the auxiliary last winter. This will be the second presentation, in this city of a children's symphony.

### SOLD TO CLINTON

Announcement Made Saturday That Former Member of 1915 Keokuk Team Had Been Disposed of.

### FEW PLAYERS ARE LEFT

Six of Last Season's Squad Have Already Been Sold and Remainder May Go Soon.

Another member of the 1915 Keokuk baseball team has been disposed of. Announcement was made yesterday by former officials of the local club that Catcher Larry Brown, who was one of the star Indian performers last season, and who has been wintering in Keokuk, has been sold to Clinton. The sale price was not announced. Brown was married here shortly after the close of the last season and has been working at a local wholesale house. He is anxious to get back in the game, however, and should make Clinton one of the best backstops in the league.

It is expected that announcement of other sales will be made soon as it is hinted that dickering are being made for the sale of the remainder of Keokuk's ball players. With Brown's sale, six of last season's diamond warriors have been disposed of. The first to go was Hollocher, who was drafted by the Portland club of the Pacific Coast league. Then Watkins, Penner and LeBeau went in a body to Marshalltown, and last January Swlek was sold to Waterloo.

The players still on hand from last year's team, and under Keokuk contracts, are Bixby, Giffin, Lowther, Lamb and Semones. From the 1914 team Sweet, Wahl and Dall remain, but these players have definitely retired from the game.
