TO GO FOR MONEY FOR CELEBRATION

Committees Will Visit Business District of City in Effort to Learn How Much Merchants Will Give.

IS TWO DAY CAMPAIGN

Soliciting Bodies Have Been Named and Will Start on Tuesday—To Get Instructions Tomorrow.

A two day's campaign for cash donations and guarantee money for the fall celebration will be waged on Tuesday and Wednesday of this week. The celebration committee, Emile F. Renaud, chairman, decided at a meeting yesterday that it will be necessary to know the amounts of both cash donations and guarantee before they can go ahead and plan for the celebration. The committee is in correspondence with several good looking agencies which are offering acts additional to those already offered. In order to know just where they stand, the committee will ask the business men of the city Tuesday and Wednesday how much they will give. "We are going to have to get the money Tuesday and Wednesday, so

the campaign will have to be on the whirlwind order," said Chairman Renaud. "We will have a meeting with the captains of the various squads as soon as we can notify them, and we expect the committees to get out Tuesday and Wednesday and comb the city."
