IOWA'S BUSINESS CONDITIONS GOOD

Banks Full of Money and Farmers are Selling Products at Good Prices.

Business conditions in Iowa this spring are unusually good according to all the evidence by which such conditions can be judged. The banks have plenty of money. Farmers who have cattle and hogs for sale are receiving top notch prices for them with cattle selling around \$10 per hundred and hogs the highest they have been in a long time. The weather is considered favorable thus far for crops as no unseasonably warm weather has been experienced as sometimes occurs in March and the soil is in nice condition for plant growth when the warm weather comes.

A. O. Wolever, chief bank examiner, said Saturday, according to the Des Moines Capital, after a short trip over the state that Iowa banks are full of money.

"The farmers are selling their stock at high prices and receiving good profits on their investments as well as a good price for the corn they have fed and this is increasing the money in the banks," said Mr. Wolever. "I saw a man this past week who said he had just made \$1,000 more than he had expected to make on his cattle and hogs by hold-

ing them for the high prices. He was making a nice profit on his cattle and receiving a good price for the food he had given them.

"Last fall the banks were loaning money to farmers and feeders for them to buy cattle. Now much of the money is coming back into the banks with considerable profit to the borrower, too."

Iowa factories are enjoying prosperity although but few of them are filling any war orders. This state now has many factories built up on conservative lines which annually do a big business.

There will be a good deal of building throughout the state in spite of the fact that materials and labor are high.

Wholesalers and retailers generally report a good business although it is a little early yet for active spring retail business.

Norris for Governor.

Waterloo Courier: D. W. Norris has been talked of for governor. There is no question that he is of gubernatorial size, but he apparently prefers campaigning for the cause of better highways in Iowa to his own political preferment. Mr. Norris is doing the state a perhaps greater service than he could in the governor's chair and his work will not be permitted to go unrecognized. Most probably we can make him governor two or four years from now.

THINKS SUFFRAGE VOTE WILL WIN

New York Newspaper Man in Burlington Yesterday, Gives His Opinion That Amendment Will Carry.

TOURS THE MIDDLE WEST

He Finds That in Some River Towns There is Considerable Apathy Regarding the Proposed Amendment.

That the suffrage amendment will carry in Iowa was the prediction of Charles T. Heaslip of the New York Tribune, who was in Burlington yesterday, according to the Gazette. The newspaperman is touring the middle west in the interest of his paper, investigating sentiment in regard to suffrage and has completed a state wide tour of Iowa.

During the past few years, Mr. Heaslip has followed the fight of the women for the vote on special assignments from his paper. He observed campaigns in Pennsylvania, New York and New Jersey and has also made extensive investigations of the after effects in states where women have received the ballot.

In his tour of Iowa, he states that the interior of the state is alive and keenly interested in the question. Suffrage sentiment predominates and the "ant" spirit is not in evidence to any great degree. Clubs have been organized, lecturers are touring the cities and he looks for a great favorable vote from the interior.

River Cities Apathetic.

His arrival in Burlington came as the termination of a journey through the river towns of the Mississippi valley. In some he found the suffrage question dormant and in others he found considerable anti-suffrage spirit.

Davenport in particular exhibits considerable anti-suffrage agitation, due to the liquor question. The belief exists that granting the vote to women would be another victory for prohibition and consequently the Davenporters are not particularly enthusiastic. Dubuque and Clinton are not particularly favorable.

In other river cities, the question of suffrage has not yet reached the point where it is being discussed on the streets, but steps are being taken to start something. In every county, suffrage committees are being organized and speakers have appeared to plead for the cause.

Mr. Heaslip characterizes himself as strictly "neutral" on the question, a casual but none the less alert observer. During the present tour he has investigated conditions in Illinois, Iowa, Missouri, Colorado and Nebraska, and with the information gathered from hundreds of interested people on both sides of the question, is thoroughly competent to judge as to the sentiment of the middle west.

Mr. Heaslip spent the day in Burlington scanning the local situation, and departed today for St. Louis, Mo. From that point he will return to New York to give the benefit of his information to the blasé New Yorkers.

months in advance, or in schemes for the artificial production of rain, the prevention of hail, and other proposals to control or modify atmospheric phenomena or to forecast them a long time in advance. Pretensions of this character meet with a certain credence because there are a number of people who still cling to the ancient belief in the influence of the moon on the growth and development of crops, and to the idea that the weather conditions depend upon planetary and astrological combinations. As a rule the general public is only partly familiar with modern scientific facts and seems overready to accept confidently at face value almost any announcement of alleged new discoveries, especially when their exploitation is clothed in skillful allusions to items of the latest scientific information and is accompanied by clever representations of the benefits that are to result.

The latest misrepresentation of this character now being presented to the people of the country in the columns of the daily press is an alleged new system of long-range weather forecasting said to be based on the rifts and spottedness of the sun and its shafts of solar radiation. When the disk of the sun is minutely examined with powerful telescopes, or when photographed with the aid of the modern spectroheliograph, the surface presents a characteristic spotted appearance which undergoes slight changes from day to day, and greater changes with longer intervals of time, depending upon the well-known rotation of the sun upon its axis and the periodic recurrence of the sunspot maxima and minima. These and certain well-known related phenomena are represented to be the basis of the so-called discovery.
