THE SMITH MURDER. Verdict of the Jury of Inquest—A Father-in-law and Two Brothers-in-law Held to Answer the Charge of Murder.

The Globe of Sunday morning contained an account of the mysterious shooting on Friday night last at Wilder Station, six miles west of Windom, Geo. F. Smith and one of his death 12 hours thereafter from the effects of wounds in the head, neck and abdomen, caused by buckshot. The shooting it was recalled was done through their vengeful work while the unfortunate victim was engaged in reading a newspaper, after his family had retired.

It now appears that the jury of inquest did not render a verdict until Sunday, when the following was rendered: We, the jury of inquest over the body of Geo. F. Smith, do believe Geo. F. Smith to have met his death by a gunshot fired through his window at 9 o'clock, Friday evening, Jan. 25th, and that the gun was in the hands of Byron J. Greenman, and that C. W. Greenman and Edward Greenman were accessories to the crime.

A Globe reporter having met last evening a gentleman from that section who is conversant with the men and things in that locality, gleaned some further information relative to the affair, which may be of interest. C. W. Greenman who, as appears above, has been held as an accessory to the murder, is the father-in-law of the deceased, and Byron J. and Edward are his sons. All three parties are under arrest and were to have had their examination yesterday afternoon. The gentleman also states, that as far as he could ascertain, the evidence against them was not direct nor positive, though public opinion seemed to point strongly towards them as the authors and instruments of the bloody deed. Why this feeling should have so strongly manifested itself, is more than the gentleman could readily account for. The fact is, however, that the three, as far as he knew, had over violated the law or borne the character of men who would be likely to imbue their hands in humane gore, whereas the evidence was not so strong as to point strongly towards them as the authors and instruments of the bloody deed.

A Serious Blaze Yesterday—Several Buildings Damaged—Loss over \$10,000. [Special telegram to the daily Globe.] OATWATON, Jan. 28.—At about 3 o'clock this morning fire was discovered in the basement of J. F. Young's jewelry store, No. 3 Bridge St. Nos. 1 and 3 are brick buildings and No. 5 and 7 are wood structures. The fire had gained considerable headway before it was discovered, but by the efforts of the firemen it was kept under control, although No. 3 is a total loss. It was thought that Nos. 5 and 7 must surely burn. The original cause of the fire is in the basement. Loss to F. H. Young, on stock and building about \$7,000 or \$8,000, fully covered by insurance. Leary & Dyne, hardware, in No. 1, damage to stock about \$800, fully insured. No. 5 was occupied by M. L. Strong, real estate office, and S. H. Stowers, city merchant, lost light, No. 8, occupied by W. Holt as drygoods store, goods damaged about \$1,000, insured in full, No. 9, occupied by Spielman & Blains, loss by damage on stock of books and stationery, about \$800 or \$1,000, insured. This is the first time the fire department have had a fair chance at a fire in the city of Oatwaton, and the engine, which was on the earliest and worked with desperate energy.

EXPRESS ROBBERIES. Felled by a Pincy Messenger who Shoots His Man. PUEBLO, Col., Jan. 21.—Last Saturday the engine on the western bound Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe railroad, was boarded a few miles east of Dodge City, by four men who attempted to rob the express messenger. Two robbers jumped on the engine compelling the engineer and fireman to do as directed while the other two boarded the express car, the express messenger, however, proved too plucky for them. He thinks he shot one of the robbers, as he was only three feet off. He stopped when the messenger fired. The robbers escaped, but are sharply pursued by a competent party, and as the trail is plain they will be captured in a few days. The robbers had previously bound and gagged the agent of the small station of Dodge City and ransacked his safe.
