MINNEAPOLIS.

How a "Graphic" Idiot Saw It—Picture Tells You!—Rest—The Fair and Its Buildings—Other News.

Yesterday the mail from the East brought the New York daily Graphic of last Saturday, which was almost entirely devoted to Minneapolis. The engravings are possible and give a very fair idea of the city. But the most important feature was entirely left out, and that is an engraving of the manufacturing centre of the city, embracing the flouring, lumber, woolen, cotton and planing mills—the great industries which are our pride and glory, and which are our wonderful growth and prosperity possible.

Another objection. Why in Minneapolis, having abundant water, is it not the West's sufficient? Because for-sooth they happen to have, away down in Massachusetts, a little fourth rate town, that has in some incomprehensible manner built up two or three cotton mills, and advertised itself as a manufacturing centre, and that is the West's sufficient? It is full time that such nonsense should cease. Minnesota has been called, by inspired newspaper editors, "the New England of the West," and the Chicago Tribune has, by the same means, called it "the Minneapolis of the West." If you please, you will simply be repeating the same old story, and the greatest flour manufacturing centre in the world; with the largest flouring mills in the world; with the greatest available water-power in the world; and the most brilliant future (in a manufacturing sense) of any city in the world. Therefore please give us a rest from the "West's sufficient" and "the Minneapolis of the West." The Graphic engravings consist of quite a full view of the West Division—the falls as they appeared twenty years ago, before the thousand industries that now congest under its fostering strength, were dreamed about; a fair view of Washington avenue, south of the Nicollet house; the harvesters' works; Humboldt mill; Washburn's "A" and "B" mills; Monitor pulp works; Fry's machine works; the High and Jefferson school buildings; Milwaukee depot; Plymouth church and Church of the Redeemer; and other buildings of importance. Oh, let us not fail to remember that W. D. Washburn's residence is pictured on the west side of the city, and that it is the school of Chicago continentalism, and there for years conducted one of its brightest and most popular papers. The handsome building owned by the Tribune company and occupied by them, also by the city hall and post-office, may be seen in our street visits to-day in the sharp angle between Hennepin and Nicollet avenues.

STILLWATER NEWS.

With the exception of No. 3 wheat, which is 78c, the quotations have not changed. The wheat crop is turning out better than anticipated, some farmers reporting as high as twenty-nine bushels to the acre.

Free McNusick yesterday was elevated to the position of deputy city clerk. It was thought necessary to appoint a deputy as Mr. Hopkins is unwell at present and unable to attend to the duties of his office.

We are reliably informed that great complaint exists among the farmers in this vicinity in regard to the inspection of wheat. The knowledge that many large manufacturing firms are buying wheat from the farmers here will pass as No. 2 in St. Paul or Minneapolis, making a difference of twelve cents per bushel. As a consequence wheat which should be sold here is being carried to those places, and the farmers, while there, purchase their wants, a great deal of money is lost to our city.

THE TRADE DOLLAR.

The Treasury department is receiving many letters from all sections inquiring whether the trade dollar is worth more than its bullion value, as announced in Dr. Linderman's circular on the subject, issued July 25. Not a few of the writers express great indignation that the government should discriminate against the trade dollar, which weighs 420 grains, in favor of the new silver dollar, which only contains 412 2/3 grains.
