ENGLISH GRAIN.

The Growing Plant and the Markets for the Home Product in a General Unfavorable Condition. American Imports in Good Request at Fair Prices.

LONDON, Jan. 21.—The Mark Lane Express says the aspect of the growing wheat plant is scarcely satisfactory, as sudden changes in temperature have tended to check its early development, but another month or six weeks more of a favorable season will be put forward as to the actual state of the crop.

Farmers' deliveries of grain have been moderate, and dissatisfaction continues in regard to the condition in which most of the English wheat comes to market. Dry parcels are quite an exception to the rule, and the quality on exchange. Nearly all samples offered are damp or sprouted.

To its defective condition must be attributed the comparative neglect with which home grown wheat has been treated, which has prevented us from sharing the increased attention shown to foreign grain. The importations of wheat from the United States have resulted at fully fair rates. The weak point as regards the future course of prices is the unusually large surplus available for export in America, which must necessarily be pressing effect if the purchasing power of France has been overestimated.

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ST. PAUL TRADE.

Weekly Review of the St. Paul Markets. OFFICE OF THE GLOBE, ST. PAUL, JAN. 21.

A fair movement has been experienced at the principal wholesale and jobbing markets this week, and for this season of the year the volume of business transactions has been generally satisfactory. The clear, open weather has a tendency to retard business in certain departments of trade, the general impression being that a cold snap accompanied by a liberal amount of snow would add fresh impetus to all classes of business.

The receipts of wheat have been large, averaging over 20,000 bushels per day, which does not include the street offerings, which are fully up to the average.

The volume of shipments is also large, and all offerings find a ready demand. No particular change has transpired in the general departments of mercantile trade, with the exception of staple dry goods, in some instances there have undergone a sensible change. The demand for dry goods, boots and shoes, hats, caps, dresses, clothing, carpets, notions, etc., compares favorably with the corresponding week last year.

The provision trade has been good, and dealers report a steady and increasing demand for pork being particularly lively.
