THE SWINDLING KETTLE

Meeting of the Special Committee Las Night-A General Feeling That the Swin dle Must Go.

The joint committee of the legislature or "the little swindling brass kettle" held a pre_ liminary meeting at the Merchants hotel las night. There were present Senators Bonniwell, Mealey, Rabilly, McCrea, Officer, Williams, Pillsbury and Page, and Representatives Campbell, W. M., Barsness, Smith, Riebe, Schroth, Cummins, Powers.

The meeting was organized by the election of Benator Rahilly to preside, and Mr. Powers as

Becretary.

Mr. Campbell, to arrive at a speedy consum ation, moved that the brass tester be abolished as the grade test of wheat in the State of Min-

This provoked a long discussion, participated in at length, and with a great frequency and freedom, by every member. Mr. Bouniwell seconded the above motion. He and Mr. Campbell spoke to the point. The farmers throughout the State were advocating and urging its arolition. It was expected that the legislature would do it, and the relief so urgently and emphatically demanded by the people

Sen tor McCrea favored it. He represented a constituency universally in favor of the abolition of the brass kettle. Senator Pillsbury had an excuse, or a word or two of defense for the kettle. However,

in deference to the general and urgent demand, he would approve of the substitution of a scaled half bushel as the standard test of grades in place of the mill-

Benator Williams, in half a dozen speeches favored the substitution of a half bushel measure, which wouldn't swell or contract, for the kettle. He believed the joker fair enough; never had perceived any difference when properly handled, but then it could be manipulated. In compliance with the general desire, he wanted to see the half busnel introduced and established as the standard, but the bra-s kettle needn't be abolished, it was so convenient, and could be used by consent between buyer and seller. Senator Page wasn't in favor of abolishing the present test until be saw something in the shape of a remedy to replace it. In the hands of honest dealers, like cards, it could be made honest. But, like three-card-monte, the little joker trick could be played. He suggested something about penalties

Mr. Powers, as the lawyer of the committee, was asked if penulties could be attached, etc., and who ther it was legel to abolish the present tester. The gentleman was at a loss to ex-

Mr. Campbell stated that it had been done. Then related that in '69 at Litchfield, he knew of an in-tane where two elerator men, who persisted in using it had been fined \$1,000 cach. Mr. Campbell continued that a universal feeling against the brass ke the existed in the State. It should be abolished, and nothing but that would satisfy the farmer. He then extorted from Senator Pillsbury the confession that the little joker could be manipulated to bring about different results. He claimed this was in itself sufficient to condemn the device. Tue speaker's own experience corroborated these "differences." He had witnessed an experiment where wheat had been made No. 3, then No. 2, and finally 611/2 pounds-the same wheat, and the same tester.
What the former wanted was a reliable tester, giving uniform results. The sealed half bushel was such a standard. This they could understand, and feared no cheating in it. At least, measures could be adopted relative to the mode of filling which would prevent such differences in the results obtaining in the us

of the little brass kettle.

Senator Pillsbury admitted that there was a process of manipulation in the brass tester, by which the farmer could be cheated. He went further, and confessed that the former had been cheated. Yet he believed if the hulf-bushel were adopted, it would not bring about the agricultural Utopia anticipated. It fact, he surmised that on the question of test, it would ultimately be found that the kettle would show up in favor of the farmer more than the half-bushel. The Senator blamed the scales more than the tester, and stated that up in Minneapolis there were many scales which scored up a weight less than was actual-

Mr. Campbell referred to the fact that these scales which were wrong never scored up too much, but too little, and the loss fell on the soller. The scales question was one to be in up in connection with the tester business. made a long and urgent appeal to abolish the brass kettle. It was a cheat and a fraud, so the farmers believed. They didn't understand the manipulations and different A Voice-"Yes, we've seen a man turn jack

every time in dealing cards, but never understoon it.' (Laughter).

Mess-rs. McCrea, Cummins, Officer, Mealey, Powers, Page, and others took part in the dis-cussion. The general verdict being, "Down with the swindling brass kettle!" At this stage of the proceedings Senator Pills-bury moved to amend Mr. Campbell's motion by saying it was the sense of this committee

that the sealed half bushel should be adopted as the standard test for grading wheat in the State of M nnesota. The amendment was accepted, and when put to vote prevailed without a dissenting voice.

Mess's. Cummins and Williams both advocated the retention of the kettle for con-venience sake—that no penalty should attach to its use, but that by consent it could be used, the half bushel being the final recent to test,
After forther desultory talk, during which
Senator Mealey highly commend-d Mr. Stacey's
(of Wright county) device for filling the little
joker as well as the half bushel. Ten thousand different men using it would produce the same Mr. McCrea moved its consideration at the

next meeting; this was further enlarged to take in all bitls, tests, etc., pertaining to the matter, and was supplemented by an invitation to wheat buyers in St. Paul and the Millers' association in Minneapolis to participate in the deliberations, and experiments with wheat to be supplied. Next Tu-sday evening was designated as the

time, and the Capitol as the place to do the testing and talking.

The question of location was only incident ally touched upon, though Senator Macdonald found an opportunity to speak a good word for Sauk Rapids, with its immense granite deposits, and Senator Daniel Buck to opposany granite location, claiming that a prison at such a location, instead of being selfsupporting, would be a continued drain upon the treasury.
