CITY COUNCIL. Regular Meeting—The Assessment List for Laying Water Mains Confirmed—Miscellaneous Business.

The regular meeting of the city council was held at the council chamber yesterday afternoon, with President Corser in the chair.

The following petitions were read and acted upon:

John H. Roth—For permission to erect a fire proof building on First avenue south, between First and Second streets. Granted.

Charles M. Hardeberg—For permission to erect a fire proof flouring mill on the corner of Fifth avenue south and First street. Granted.

Room & Merrill—For permission to repair part of building at 117 Second avenue south. Referred to committee on fire department.

W. A. Abbe and other property owners in the vicinity of block 63 on Third street, presented a frame building against the council allowing A. A. Pond to remove a frame building to said lot. Referred to committee on fire department.

Thomas Lowry and other property owners granted to a frame building being moved to lot 83, block 2.

A petition asking that Charles Conklin be appointed city forester, was referred to the new council.

Petition from Hose company No. 5 and Hook and Ladder company No. 2, asking the council to erect a suitable and convenient house for the two companies, was referred to committee on fire department.

The monthly budget of bills was presented and allowed.

A sidewalk was ordered laid on the east side of Washington avenue from Sixth to Eighth avenue south.

The committee on fire department reported back the application of R. J. Mendenhall to move a wooden building, and the report was adopted.

The committee on gas report the immediate necessity of entering into a new contract with the Minneapolis Gas Light company, the present contract expiring by limitation on March 20th. The committee were instructed to make a contract with the company for one year at the same rate as the last contract.

Sec. 2. The county treasurer of the county of Ramsey shall pay to the city treasurer of the city of St. Paul, an estimated amount of the sum of one hundred and twenty dollars (\$120) for each year, to be paid on the first day of each month next after such taxes or monies are collected or received, any general or special law to the contrary notwithstanding.

Sec. 3. The board of public works shall on the first Tuesday of May in each year, transmit to the common council of said city the name of a competent and scientific person as civil engineer to the board of public works of said city for their approval or rejection by a majority vote of all the members of said common council, said engineer shall perform all the civil engineering required by the board of public works, and the promotion of all public works committed to their charge or required by said board in connection with official duty. He shall be ex-officio civil engineer. Said civil engineer shall transmit no other reports than those required of him in the performance of his duties as civil engineer during his continuance in office.

Sec. 4. The police department of the city of St. Paul, Minnesota, shall be headed by the chief executive officer, who shall be the chief executive officer, a captain of police, one sergeant, a detective, and as many policemen, patrolmen and police officers as may be authorized by the common council of said city.

Sec. 5. Upon the receipt of a warrant for the collection of a sidewalk assessment, the city treasurer shall forthwith give notice by three (3) days published notice in a newspaper of the city, that such warrant is in his hands for collection, briefly describing its nature, and requesting all persons interested to make immediate payment at his office, and that in default of same notice will be collected at the cost and expense of the persons liable for the payment of such assessment.

Sec. 6. The common council are hereby authorized in making future improvements on Seventh street, in their proceeding with such assessment, should there be any building in whole or in part upon the land to be taken, as aforesaid, to consider the propriety of letting said building remain upon such land taken as aforesaid, until such further condemnation as they may deem the interest of the city, and if they shall determine to let the building remain on said land for any given period they shall determine the value of the use of said land to the owner of said building for the time said building may be permitted to remain, which sum, when ascertained, shall be deducted from the damages awarded for said building.

Sec. 7. The common council of the city of St. Paul by a three-fourths vote of all its members elect shall have the power to grant to individual firms or corporations the use of the streets and public grounds of said city for the purpose of laying pipes for conducting steam for heating and motive power, upon such conditions as the common council may determine by resolution. Provided, however, that said pipes shall always be laid under the direction of the board of public works and shall be at all times under the control of said board, and provided further, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as authorizing any interference whatsoever with the rights heretofore granted either by law, contract or ordinance to said St. Paul Gas Light company or the Saint Paul Water company.

Sec. 8. The board of health of the city of Saint Paul shall consist of four members of the common council, to be appointed by the president of said council on the second Thursday of May in each year, together with the city engineer of said city, and the city and county physician who shall be elected as now provided by law. Provided, he shall be elected on the first Tuesday of December of each year.

Sec. 9. The jurisdiction of the board of health of the city of Saint Paul shall extend over all lakes and water courses in the county of Ramsey to the same extent as within the limits of said city.

Sec. 10. All acts and parts of acts contravening the provisions of this act are hereby repealed.

Sec. 11. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.
