CITY GLOBULES.

Patriotic Sunday. Washington's birthday. The Olympian of his kind, his shining parts but "gave the world assurance of a man." The society connected with the Unity church will give, on Friday evening at the church, a grand vocal and instrumental concert. The Great Union band will give a grand concert at Pfeiffer's hall this afternoon. It promises to be the most popular concert of the series. Drunk again—"that's what's the matter with Hannah Welch," said the officer who carried this unfortunate into the lockup last night. Twenty-nine witnesses have been subpoenaed in the case of the State against Egan and Daly, the examination of which takes place to-morrow morning. Alonzo Carpenter, who was committed on Friday for the larceny of a horse blanket, paid his fine on yesterday and was released from the county jail. The ladies of St. Joseph's parish are making preparations for a grand entertainment and oyster supper to be held at Pfeiffer's hall on the evening of St. Patrick's day. Cut outing for the St. Louis market is to be resumed next week. This industry has given work to some seventy men and numerous teams during a large portion of the winter. Victor Richards was little, if any, better on Saturday, and is still in a critical condition. His many friends at White Bear and in St. Paul are still hoping he will pull through. Mr. Leaman, the White Bear boat builder, has nearly completed the hull of a handsome sloop, twenty-one feet keel, for a St. Paul gentleman, besides smaller craft for various parties. A pleasing entertainment will be given at Turner hall this evening, consisting of declamations and vocal and instrumental music by Seibert's orchestra and the members of the society. The first grand masquerade of the season under the auspices of the Standard club will take place on Thursday evening. The arrangements are most elaborate and the occasion will prove highly enjoyable. This evening at Plymouth church the service will be in keeping with the day, and of a patriotic character. Some of the teachings of Washington's life, in their bearings upon the present, will be the theme of discourse. The Union Depot company gives evidence that it is a live institution by advertising this morning for proposals for 50,000 cubic yards of grading. That means that the company is now ready to go ahead on its projected improvements and will build the depot this year. At 5 o'clock yesterday morning officer Zirkelbach extinguished a fire which started among the dry goods boxes in the rear of Nichols & Dean's warehouse on Third street. The fire originated from ashes thrown out by a porter from one of the buildings in the block. An official circular has been forwarded to the United States internal revenue collectors throughout the country ordering the measurement of all beer casks in order that their contents may be subject to taxation. The order is made on section 3,373 of the amended statutes of 1879. A young man named Cornelius Griffin was before Judge McGroarty yesterday afternoon, charged with carrying a buffalo robe from a farmer named James Slater. The robe was taken from a wagon at the Montreal house on Minnesota street last Tuesday, and pawned at Kohl's second hand store for 30 cents. The defendant alleged that he bought the robe from a stranger and that it had been pawned after he learned it had been stolen. The court thought his story lacked consistency, and he was sent to the cooler for fifteen days. "Disreputable characters like the proverbial hen penny have a cork-like buoyancy in swimming to the front. So it is with the Jewish money bags of America, who resist the police courts on an average of three times a month, or as often as she happens to be released from jail. Yesterday morning she visited Rogers' block and attempted to bang in a door with an axe. The amusement was interrupted by Mr. Rogers, who handed the damsel to Officer Newell. She was before Judge McGroarty and went to the House of Good Shepherds for sixty days. Gen. A. J. Edgerton, of Mantoville, Dodge county, having declined the appointment of Gov. Pillsbury for judge of the Fifth Judicial district, made by the death of Judge Samuel Lord, the governor tendered the appointment to Hon. Thomas S. Buchanan, of Fairbault, who has accepted the same. Mr. Buchanan has long occupied a leading position in his profession, representing his county in the State Senate the sessions of 1874-5, succeeding his law partner, and is at present a member of the board of regents of the State university. Hon. Isaac Staples of Stillwater, when met by a GLOBE envoy yesterday, said that meeting with last night, he would have over 25,000,000 feet of logs stacked on his main St. Croix, Crow, Pine, Apple and Ann rivers. His crews are pushing things along the entire line and he expects to increase the cut for the season to between 20,000,000 and 30,000,000 feet, the latter figure being his cut last year. Mr. Staples says that owing to the continuance of snow the present winter, he has been able to go back a greater distance from the river than in any previous season, and that as a consequence he has secured a better quality of logs, better than at any previous cut.
