

SEARCHING FOR MINERALS.

Return of an Old Minersman and Resumption of Explorations. Stepping into the Merchants last evening the Globe had the pleasure of a hearty hand-shake with an old friend and acquaintance, Hon. Geo. C. Stone, formerly of Duluth, but who has been spending the past three years in Philadelphia. Mr. Stone is well known through the State, and as a member of the legislature of 1876, introduced and was instrumental in passing an act for the incorporation of mining companies, in which subject he has been more or less interested for a number of years. The returns fully impressed with the great future of the North Star State, and expresses a confident belief in the mineral resources of the north shore, which in time will surely develop into importance.

In 1876 Mr. Stone organized an expedition of an extensive character to examine Mesaba Range, which did not result very satisfactorily. He, however, has never abandoned the idea that mineral deposits which will justify the investment of large capital for development exist there—either in Minnesota or immediately over the boundary line. Noticing him later in consultation with that veteran explorer, George S. Stantz, the Globe no longer felt any doubt that something was in the wind, and forthwith essayed an interview in which Mr. Stone, in reply to a series of questions, admitted that he had come on an expedition to investigate the mineral resources of the north shore, and where the most eminent capitalists to institute thorough and practical search for minerals in the section named either in this State or in Canada near the boundary line. During the summer of 1878, the Globe, through the cooperation of character and reputation who will visit the localities named and report to the parties interested.

Further information was also gleaned to the effect that immediate arrangements will be made that Mr. Stone's headquarters will be at Duluth. It is hoped the results will be such as to warrant his location there permanently as he has great faith in Duluth and in the State. Important Meeting of the High Joints Today. The high joints interested in the construction of a union depot in this city, being prominent officials of all the railroads centering in St. Paul, are all in the city, and will hold a meeting today, at which it is correctly supposed and believed that arrangements will be perfected for immediately commencing the work of construction. As known proposals for the necessary excavation have already been invited. It is also understood that the ground plans for the structure have been agreed upon, and that arrangements for securing the requisite funds have been made, lacking only confirmation by the meeting today. The plans for the elevation, or the style, material and finish of the structure have not been definitely decided upon, but it is understood that they will be of a character in keeping with the commanding position St. Paul is becoming as a railroad center, and in every way calculated to be a credit to the city for many years to come.

Condition of the Railroads. After a storm there comes a calm, was found verified upon visiting the different railroads yesterday. Manager Sargent, of the Northern Pacific, reported fine weather, wind quiet and sun shining brightly along the entire line, and trains all making schedule time between St. Paul and Jamestown. West of that point the company had 17 engines and upwards of 100 men engaged in opening the road to ward Bismarck, while some 75 men were working east from Bismarck, and all possible industry and energy would be used to open the road through to Bismarck. The progress was necessarily slow, however, owing to the fact that the snow in the cuts and along the track has been packed against the consistency of hard, so firm, in fact, that it has to be broken up by the laborers before the snow-plows can make any impression upon it. In the meantime passengers for the west are held at Jamestown, where all engines are borne by the company. Manager Hill, of the St. Paul & Manitoba road, reported that the temporary blockade on the St. Vincent division was removed Sunday evening, all trains running yesterday without delay, the passengers arriving last evening, bringing through passengers from the Peninsula connection. Trains on all other roads were moving with regularity.
