

A DELIBERATE SWINDLE.

W. H. Stormer Accumulates Several Thousand Dollars and Departs. The Globe a day or two ago contained a brief allusion to the sudden and somewhat mysterious disappearance of Mr. W. H. Stormer of the grocery firm of Stormer & Otto, doing business on the corner of Seventh and Broadway streets.

It is some ten or eleven years ago that Mr. Stormer commenced business in the grocery line on the corner of Seventh and Broadway, in his own name. Several years ago he took in a partner named Rode, who in turn was bought out a little over a year ago by Mr. Peter Otto, since which time the business has been conducted under the firm name of Stormer & Otto.

Mr. Otto, while a member of the firm, was engaged in other business, and left the management of the grocery on Seventh street almost entirely in the hands of his partner, who expressed confidence in his integrity and honesty as well as in his pecuniary responsibility.

On Saturday last Mr. Stormer disappeared and has not been heard of since. This naturally led to inquiries which proved conclusively that Mr. Stormer has "skipped out," leaving a large number of his friends in the lurch to the amount of several thousand dollars.

On the 9th of November, 1878, a gunsmith named Herman Zwierzniski, doing business at No. 186 East Seventh street, died leaving no relatives in this country, his only heirs being his father and mother in Prussia.

The parties reside in one of the streets abutting on the lake, and it is alleged that during Allen's absence from home the house was entered by Mrs. Lee, who ransacked the furniture. The case will be tried today.

Mr. Dowd, whose saloon on Wabasha street was burglarized a few days ago, has obtained no clue to the burglars, but he still continues fully supplied with the choicest wines and liquors. In fact it was because his stock was of such choice variety that he attributes the robbery.

CITY GLOBULES.

St. Paul Lodge No. 17, A. O. U. W., nominate officers for the ensuing year at their meeting this evening. It is therefore hoped there will be a full attendance of members. The Grand Commandery of Knights Templars of Minnesota, will meet in annual convocation at Fairbairn on Thursday next, the 24th inst. A large attendance is expected.

In the case of Margaret Shaber against the St. Paul & Manitoba Railroad company, on trial in the district court yesterday, a motion to dismiss was argued by counsel for defendant and denied. A jury trial was ordered.

A jolly rat, from Stillwater, was arrested by Officer Newall last night for raising perturbation on the levee. He took off his shoes and tried to imitate an Indian war dance. He was lodged in the tower. A brakeman named Rockwood had two fingers of his left hand crushed yesterday morning while coupling cars in the St. Paul, Minneapolis & Manitoba railroad yard. Dr. Murphy fixed up the wounded digits.

Judge Brill rendered a decision yesterday in the case of C. Stahlmann against J. Tinney and others, in which action was brought to settle the title to real estate. The court holds that the plaintiff is the owner in fee of the real estate in question. A young man under the influence of "bug juice" entered a Third street car last evening, and as the vehicle reached Wabasha street he jammed his head through the glass window of the front door. The car was stopped and he was given the grand breach.

The Sixth infantry, recently removed to the department of the Missouri, are now at Bismarck on route to their new stations. In case sufficient transportation facilities can be obtained the troops will move to-day. They will be mainly stationed in Colorado. Replevin papers were issued yesterday to a man named David Gigg, for the recovery of a watch alleged to have been won at a raffish. The watch was bought up by Fred Anderson, and is said to have been worth \$70. The case will come up in the municipal court.

The promenade concert at Rice Park last evening, under the auspices of the Great Union band, attracted a large number of appreciative citizens. The selections were choice and artistically rendered. Altogether it was one of the most enjoyable affairs of the season. John Bushner, of Stillwater, was before United States Commissioner Cardozo yesterday charged with retailing liquor without complying with the special tax law. He gave bonds in the sum of \$300 for his appearance at the next term of the United States circuit court.

A auction took place in the Sixth ward yesterday between a teamster named Dunn and a laboring man named James Hughes. The latter appeared at the police court, with his wife in mourning, and swore out a warrant for the arrest of Dunn. The case will be heard to-day. A farmer's team took the bits into their mouths at Bridge square yesterday morning, and what might have been a serious runaway was nipped in the bud by a teamster who jumped in front of the runaways and seized them by the reins. No material damage was done.
