

DEMOCRATIC COUNTY CONVENTION

The Democrats of the county of Ramsey are requested to meet on Friday, the 23rd day of September, 1880, between the hours of 6 and 7 o'clock p. m., for the purpose of electing delegates to a county convention, to be held at the Old Court House, on Saturday, September 24th, 1880, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, for the purpose of putting in nomination candidates for the ensuing election, viz: County Auditor, County Commissioner, County Judge, Municipal Judge, One Senator from the First, Second and Third wards, One Representative from the First and Second wards, One Representative from the Third ward, One Representative from the Fourth ward, One Representative from the Fifth ward, One Representative from the Sixth ward, One School Superintendent from the county, One County Commissioner from the county, One School Superintendent from the county, The convention will also select twenty-nine (29) delegates to the Congressional convention to be held at Minneapolis, on Tuesday, the 7th day of September.

The primary election in the First, Second, Third and Fifth wards will be held at the usual place of holding elections in the First ward of each of the wards respectively. In the Fourth ward the first precinct will vote at the Ramsey street engine house. The Second and Third precincts at the usual and last voting place in the Third ward. In the Sixth ward at the Hancock and English club rooms. In the fourth ward at the last voting place in each ward respectively, except the town of Rose, which will be held at the new town hall in said town.

The above committee having met on the call of the chairman, the following members being present: P. H. Kelly, Chairman; A. Allen, First Ward; John Bell, Second Ward; Mat. Koch, Third Ward; Robert A. Smith, Fourth Ward; Wm. Neilson and Lorenzo Hoyt, county precincts. It was unanimously agreed that the above convention for the nomination of county officers and Legislative ticket be postponed until Tuesday, September 14th, 1880, and the convention be held on Monday, September 13th, preceding, at the time and place given in the above call.

The caucus and convention as above called will be held at the times and places stated, viz: The caucus on Friday, September 23d, and the convention on Saturday, September 24th, 1880, for the election of the delegates to attend the Third Congressional District Convention, to be held at Minneapolis on Tuesday next, September 7th.

The action of the committee was entirely harmonious, without any difference of opinion, and this action is simply taken to produce the best feeling and the entire harmony of the Democratic party of Ramsey county. 
