Mankato is fast becoming a manufacturing city. All our manufacturing institutions are paying well. They furnish employment for a large number of hands and are leading attractions in our growing city. The St. Paul and Mankato (Fourth street) has been rented by a firm of wheat buyers from Sioux City by the name of F. H. Peavy & Co. They are large operators and are buying wheat at twenty-six stations on the Sioux City line, and they transport, from which their wheat is shipped to this point and cleaned for market. They propose to make Mankato as good a market as can be found anywhere in the country. The elevator is to be run by Thomas Bennett, and that is evidence enough that it will be run in the right manner, that farmers will get pay for all the wheat they sell through the Mankato elevator grade.

NEIGHBORHOOD NEWS

Your correspondent recently took a stroll through the Mankato Linned Oil mill. The mill has recently been started and is now running day and night. It is one of the leading enterprises of our city. During the season it has been running, it has produced new machinery put in which greatly increases the capacity of the mill. One cannot visit this mill without admiring the perfection of the machinery and its great efficiency. Additional work has been put in here has been put in. Crushers are used instead of the old stonies which were formerly used. They have tanks for storing 2,500 barrels of oil. They are receiving from four to five thousand barrels of seed per day. They get this seed from Southwestern Iowa and Southern Dakota. They are now paying \$1 per bushel for seed. This seed used by this company costs them \$175,000 per year—a great source of revenue to the farmers of the section above referred to. Two large brick warehouses and large bins in the mill proper are used by the company to store the seed in. These are now being filled and the company will have seed enough to run during the whole year. The mill is now being built in a new way, which will increase its capacity to one thousand gallons per day.
