THE ELECTION NEARBY.

The result yesterday in Ohio and Indiana was what those who have clearly watched the canvass in these States expected. The Republicans by the most desperate efforts, and the lavish use of money, have been enabled to carry Ohio, but all their efforts in Indiana were unavailable.

The result yesterday practically settles the November contest. There is no doubt of the result in New York and New Jersey and but little doubt that Connecticut and Illinois will join the Democratic column in November.

As the "Solid South" with Indiana and New York makes Hancock's election certain, the additional States simply swell his majority. The GLOBE congratulates the Democracy and the country upon the auspicious termination of the Presidential contest of 1880.

OHIO DETAILS.

CLEVELAND, Oct. 12.—The polls closed all over the State at 6 o'clock, and all indications at this hour are that one of the heaviest votes has been polled in the history of the State. In 1879, the total vote was: Foster, Republican, for governor, 336,321; Ewing, Democrat, 319,312; Platt, National, 9,073; Stewart, Prohibition, 4,435. Foster's majority over all, 3,854; plurality 17,129. This year the comparison will be made with the figures for governor in 1879, the vote on supreme court (this year) being used for that purpose. The candidates are as follows: For supreme court, G. W. McIlvaine, Republican, M. D. Crowell, Democrat, for secretary of State, Chas. Townsend, Republican, Wm. Lang, Democrat, clerk of supreme court, Denton Crowell, Republican; H. J. Fanning, Democrat; member of public works commission, B. H. Homer, Republican, N. J. Jackson, Democrat; school commissioner, Gen. F. Dowell, Republican; J. B. Burns, Democrat. The Greenback vote will not be considered in this comparison. There are 1,569 precincts in the State, and it is expected that nearly three-fourths of them will be heard from by 1 o'clock to-night.

The first return was heard from Green Camp Township, Marion county, which gives McIlvaine 277; Fallot 164, a Republican gain of 12.

The precincts in this county have been reconstructed since last year, so that no comparison can be made by precincts with last year's vote and the returns will therefore be out of the general summary. The vote of the city of Cincinnati is expected to be given as a whole later in the evening. The county precincts in this county will be included along with the other returns.

At this hour fourteen precincts are heard from by precincts with last year's vote over last year. In some cases there is a very considerable gain in the number of votes cast. With two exceptions, all the Republicans have gained in these precincts, their net gain being 106 votes.
