HARWOOD'S STOCK.

Incidents tin he First Day's Sale Under the Sheriff's Hammer.

The sheriff's sale of Harwood's stock which has been the chief topic of conversation in this city for the past month, came off yester day. The sale was announced to come off at 10 o'clock, but as early as 8:30 o'clock the fur commenced. At that hour a number of the interested creditors and a delegation of lawyers put in an appearance at the court house to listen to the ruling of the court on an application made by Morrison & Fitch, on behalf of certain creditors, to restrain the sheriff from selling he stock in a bulk. The sheriff, through his attorney, J. M. Shaw, endeavored, in a long argument, to show the court that, after consulting the attorneys of the creditors and also a number of the parties who expected to buy more or less of the stock, that a larger amount could be realized from the sale of the stock in bulk than by parcel. His attorney stated that a minimum of 6 per cent, would be realized by selling in bulk, while by selling at retail or parcel a portion of the commenced. At that hour a number of the by selling at retail or parcel a portion of the goods would have to be sacrificed, and would not, in his judgment, bring anything near the above mentioned amount. However, the sheriff did not intend to take upon himself any responsibily in the matter, and desired simply to sell so as to realize the largest amount. He would under the present circumstances, if the court felt competent to direct the manner in which the sale should be made, proceed under such direction. It would be proper to state here the sale should be made, proceed under such direction. It would be proper to state here that the court was alive to the delicate situation in which it was placed. While suggesting a great number of ways in which the sale could be made so as to be satisfactory to all parties, concerned, no particular directions were given.

The sheriff, through his attorney, desired to know the minimum price at which the credit ors would be satisfied to see the stock start-Attorney Fitch, who represented the last of

Attorney Fitch, who represented the last of the judgment creditors on the list, stated that he would not consent to the sale in bulk unless the minimum price of seventy cents was realized, which figure would be just large enough to reach his clients.

After a long discussion, the sheriff, through his attorney, proposed that if the restraint was dismissed he would go on with the sale, either in bulk or parcel, as the creditors might agree. Upon the attorney of the judgment creditors agreeing to this proposition, the restraint was dismissed.

Shortly after 10 o'clock Sheriff Thompson arrived at the store to conduct the sale or post-

rived at the store to conduct the sale or post pone it as the creditors or buyers might-agree The sheriff stated the stock, based upon the inventory of July 1, 1880, was valued at \$300,

A motion was made that the sale be adjourned until 2 o'clock and the creditors adjourned to the Nicollet nouse.

At the creditors' meeting, the object was stated to affect an agreement or basis upon which the sale was to be made. After the hour and a half of talk, there being no signs of any agreement, the meeting adjourned.

The sale commenced at 2 o'clock with a stim attendance, the goods being sold in small parcels.

The buyers were present in large numbers and the bidding was very spirited. The buyers were principally home merchants and the goods, cotton dress goods and domestics
