

CITY GLOBULES.

Judge Wilkin signed the testimony yesterday in the case of A. R. Capelhart vs. James King. On the calendar for the May term of the district court there are 117 civil and 27 criminal cases.

Deputy Sheriff Wm. A. Richler, who was injured while riding a few days since, will be on deck again to-day.

The case of Phillip Haas against the English Opera company for \$200 damages is set for trial on Thursday, May 5th.

General court martials are to meet—next Monday, at Fort Lincoln, and the other on the 5th, at Fort Gates.

John Rodgers is about to build two fine dwelling houses on the property, at the southeast corner of Somerset and St. Paul streets.

Louisa Greenlee has commenced an action for divorce from her husband, Henry Greenlee, on the grounds of habitual drunkenness.

Mr. P. Griffin, of the Sixth ward, offers the use of three or four lots free of charge to the destitute, if the city will build shanties for them.

Sheriff Garrabker, of Crookston, brought an insane lady to St. Paul yesterday, and lodged her in the county jail for safe keeping.

About noon yesterday a lumber drunk fell on his nose at Seven Corners and almost paralyzed his organ of smell. He was unable to rise and was yanked in by Officer Baer.

A decree of divorce was rendered by Judge Bill yesterday, granting the application of plaintiff in the case of Nellie Scott against Thomas Scott on the grounds of cruelty.

James Welsh budged up on sixty second benzine, and when found by the officer he was wrestling with the jim-jams. He was up yesterday and went to the roof for five days.

Governor Pillsbury and Clerk Carlton went to Minneapolis yesterday afternoon to attend the funeral of an infant child of Hon. C. A. Pillsbury, a brother of the governor, who died Tuesday.

A deed was filed in the register of deeds of office yesterday, representing the transfer of lots 1, 2, and 3, block 20, Robert and Randall's addition, by G. W. Wheeler to James G. McMillen, \$10,000.

Secretary Young, of the State board of immigration, figures from partial data in his possession that from 8,000 to 10,000 emigrants have already found homes in Minnesota since the first of January.

The match game of billiards at the Bellevue last night, between Frank Billiter, of Minneapolis, and Wm. Toie, of this city, 500 points up for \$100, was won by the latter by a score of 492 to 500 points.

A pleasant wedding took place at White Bear lake last evening, being the marriage of Gus Stiles, the sailor boy, and Miss Julia Olson. After the ceremony, a few friends were called in and a joyous time was had.

Sheriff Dill, of Winona county, passed through the city yesterday for Stillwater, with Sylvester Miner, sentenced to the penitentiary for two years for polygamy. Hon. C. F. Buck kept the sheriff company on his trip.

John Casey was found fast asleep night before last, in a tin shop on Seventh street, having climbed through the window. He was before the court yesterday, and on producing evidence that he was employed at the shop the case was dismissed.

Yesterday forenoon a tall, stony looking personage, walked into city hall, drew a trade shkel from his tattered trousers, and handing it to Capt. Clark, he walked out, stating that it was bad and had been passed on him by a saloon keeper. Instances of such rare honesty are very few.

A whole-ouled German named Thomas Heneof, residence on the short line reported, an infant had been left at his house early yesterday morning. It is evidently the one of which an account appeared yesterday's issue of the Globe. He is the father of eleven children a poor man but expresses a willingness to raise it if it is not called for.

About 10 o'clock last night a telephone message came to city hall requesting an officer to call at Dr. Stewart's residence, overlooking the Short Line bluff. Officer Newell responded, and was informed that loud cries had been heard proceeding from the vicinity of the rear, as if from a room in the upstairs. A search resulted in nothing definite.

Adam Johnson, a burly son of the sod, with curly hair and a general look of squeamishness about his fat and dirty person, came down from Fort Buford yesterday and was arrested at the depot by Officer Galvin blind drunk. He had three quarts of bug juice, only one of the bottles being empty. In the afternoon he was before the court, and when sentenced to the bastille he got down on his knees and begged for mercy. He wanted to leave town, and if caught again he would ask the court to make it 2,000 times harder on him. Sentence was suspended.

The case of the State against Edward Coten, charged with receiving stolen property, was resumed in the police court yesterday morning. Several witnesses were sworn for the defense to prove that some of the goods found in their possession had been brought from Canada.

Mr. Horton made an able plea for the discharge of the defendant, but he was held and committed in default of \$1,000 bail. Among other things to be brought before the grand jury when the case comes up will be the hitherto unreported fact that two weeks before their arrest a large quantity of goods were recovered for Hollinghurst, a dry goods dealer on Seventh street, who at that time would not prosecute.
