MINNEAPOLIS GLOBELETS.

There are eight prisoners awaiting the action of the grand jury. The May term of the district court commences this morning.

A young man was arrested last night on suspicion of being a harness thief. James Riley kept his saloon open on Sunday, and for this act paid \$20 fine yesterday morning.

The supreme lodge Knights of Honor, which meets this afternoon, will be tendered a banquet and reception this evening.

The Crusaders' Total Abstinence society will give a musical and literary entertainment at Catholic Association hall this evening.

A horse thief from Big Stone county known as Shiftless Jack, escaped from our jail Sunday evening, owing to the carelessness of our jailor Matt Bras.

The street sprinkling petitions are being circulated, and by the number of signers the mayor expects that the system will be in operation in about three weeks.

John Thompson, proprietor of a saloon on Washington avenue, was fined \$10 and costs yesterday for assaulting a patron of his saloon named Charles Sequist.

Mary Brown and Ole Polson, two old timers, were before Judge Foley yesterday for the usual charge of drunkenness. Mary went up for thirty and Ole for ten days.

John Kelly, who stole a half dozen tin pans from Savage's second hand store on Saturday, and then sold them to the owner, was sent to the jail for one month yesterday.

Yesterday morning Wm. Gray attempted to collect a small bill from D. S. Redding by choking him. The court fined him \$20 and in default he was committed for thirty days.

Geo. Jobon, formerly a real estate dealer, has skipped the town with a prostitute named Mattie Wilson and \$400, which he realized from the sale of his home where his wife and family reside. His family is left penniless.

Much interest is manifested in sporting circles as regards the trotting match to occur on May 17th, between trotters owned by Pat Sullivan and Henry Seely. Both of the owners are confident of coming out ahead, and it will be a race for blood.

Frank Snyder was arrested on Sunday by Officer Walton, while trying to sell goods supposed to have been stolen at a second hand store yesterday morning. He was before the police court, and had his case continued until to-morrow morning.

M. V. P. Gatsahl, died at his residence No. 1627 Seventh street south yesterday afternoon. He was collector for the Harvester works and about a week ago was run over while attempting to board a train at Ramsey, and had to have one of his legs amputated.

It was reported at the police station yesterday afternoon that N. D. Haskins, of Long Lake, had mysteriously disappeared. He came to Minneapolis last Thursday with a considerable sum of money to pay taxes and make some purchases. The taxes have not been paid, and he has not been heard of.

Charles Sequist preferred a charge of assault and battery against John Thompson, a saloon keeper, and then failed to appear against him. On Sunday he was collared by the police, and yesterday morning was brought into court, and after testifying was fined \$20 for contempt. Not having the dust he went up for twenty days.

The following dispatch was received by the police officers yesterday: "Look out for Herman Frantuch" who murdered W. Hoffman near Dayton. Frantuch has sandy mustache and whiskers, and walks with a forward bend. For an intelligent and full description of the man to be arrested, who is unknown to the authorities, the above takes the prize.

The examination of Andrew Rowan and Thomas C. Cunningham, charged with assault with dangerous weapons, was continued at the police court yesterday morning. Rowan pleaded guilty and was fined \$75, which amount he paid. Cunningham has his case partially tried on Friday, owing to the absence of his counsel, James W. Lawrence, waived examination and had his case turned over to the grand jury, he being released on \$500 bonds.

Coroner's Inquest. A coroner's inquest was held yesterday afternoon at Warner's undertaking establishment over the remains of Thomas Elliot, who was killed while at work in a well on the farm of John Fick, in Medina township, on Saturday. The testimony of William Shenton and Charles Lane, employees of Elliot, was heard, and Drs. Hamilton and Rogers testified to making a post-mortem examination of the body. The jury returned a verdict that deceased came to his death by suffocation from carbonic acid gas.

CLEAR AS MUD. Two Suits Involving Precisely the Same Points Decided Exactly the Opposite by Different Judges.

New York, May 9.—Judge Spier, of the supreme court, handed down a decision this morning on the motion in the suit brought by Rufus Hatch against the Western Union and American Union Telegraph companies to prevent the issue of \$5,526,500 increase of capital stock. Judge Spier decided in favor of the plaintiff and continues the temporary injunction, previously granted, restraining the distribution of the increase of stock pending the judgment.

New York, May 9.—In the suit brought by Wm. Williams versus the consolidated telegraph companies, an action similar in its nature to that brought by Rufus Hatch, Judge Trux, of the supreme court, rendered a decision denying the plaintiff's motion for an injunction. Judge Trux, Dr. Norvin Green and officers of the defendant companies will be called to the stand. The case is first on the calendar, and will, in all probability, be reached by recess. The trial will last several days.

Judge Trux also decided to sustain the injunction previously granted in regard to the motion to punish the defendants for contempt by violating the injunction order. The judge grants the motion in the following opinion in the case of Wm. L. Williams vs. "I think there has been a technical violation of injunction order. The parties should have entirely refrained from interfering with the suit after the order was issued. The issuing of the certificate of indebtedness was done under the advice of counsel and not evasive or in violation of the injunction. I can't see that the plaintiff has suffered injury except the expenses of proceedings. They must pay a counsel fee to plaintiff or his counsel of \$25."
