

A SERIOUS ACCIDENT. Two Cars Fly the Track and Two Passengers Injured.

The Omaha express, on the St. Paul & Sioux City road, due here at 11 o'clock yesterday morning, met with an accident that came near being serious in its character. The train under charge of Conductor Messer, was nearly an hour behind time, and, reaching this end of the line, all possible speed was put on the engine to make up for lost time.

It was fortunate for the passengers that the accident happened at a point on the road where there was neither cut nor embankment. The cars were pretty badly damaged, but not as serious as they would have been had the accident occurred half a mile on either side of the scene of the disaster.

The cars were not damaged and the track was cleared in time for the passenger of the Omaha express which left here at 3:40 P. M.

On the Levee. Capt. Reaney received yesterday to ship by the Bald Eagle of the St. Paul & St. Louis line to-day, forty-five St. Paul harvesters (cord binders), for St. Louis, and a car load of wooden cave troughs and pipes, the latter made at Minneapolis for Hannibal and St. Louis.
