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DISASTROUS FLAMES.

Loss From Fifty to Seventy-five Thousand Dollars—Insurance, \$37,300—Another Large Fire Follows—Fuller & Simpson, the Daily Herald, Budstikken, and Several Other Establishments Wholly or Partially Destroyed—Loss, \$12,000—About Two-Thirds Covered by Insurance.
