

CITY GOBULES. A small section of the floor of the pavilion at Union park sank down yesterday afternoon, but no one was hurt.

Quite a number of cases of pocket picking took place at Union park yesterday. A Minneapolis man lost his watch and chain; a graduate of the law, residing at 1300 Broadway, lost his leather bag, containing a loss of about \$45, and another a violent theft.

THE State Turnout and the Great Crowd in Attendance. All the way from 7,000 to 10,000 persons, according to the opinion of different people, visited Union park yesterday.

They came from the north and south, from St. Paul and Minneapolis, and other portions of the State. It was well known that the members of the State turn-out would be present, and this, added to the favorable weather, drew out the crowd.

The news reported of the terrible disaster at New Ulm had a tendency to throw a gloom over some of the members of the turn-out, and those from that city left for their homes at Black River Falls, and other points, to carry them. This reduced the number present very perceptibly.

However there were enough to make the spacious park look gay in every portion of it. The trains came in from different parts of the country. There could not have been a pleasanter day so far as weather was concerned. True, it was warm, but a gentle breeze cooled the heat, and the attendant shade to be found in every part of the park, made it quite comfortable.

The Great Western band of St. Paul, and Danz' band of Minneapolis, were stationed in different parts of the park, and at intervals discontinued the fine music. In the meantime the Turners were giving the vast assemblage specimens of their skill as acrobats and athletes.

The different refreshment stands were well patronized, as was the bowling alley. In fact it was a red letter day for Union park.
