INCORPORATION. ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION. The undersigned, Springer Harbaugh, Cushman K. Davis, Jacob H. Stewart and Charles W. McIntyre, all residents of the city of St. Paul, county of Ramsey and State of Minnesota, and Robert Fairweather, William Anglin and Frank Ives, all residents of Crookston, in the county of Polk, in said State, and Michael Graver and Charles Lockhart, both residents of the city of Pittsburgh, county of Allegheny, State of Pennsylvania, hereby associate themselves for the purpose of forming a corporation under and in pursuance of the statutes of the State of Minnesota, and declare:

FIRST. That the name of this corporation shall be The Lake Superior and Dakota Railway Company, and its general purpose and the nature of its business shall be to construct a direct line, as near as may be consistent with convenient facilities, and operate a railroad from a point at or in the town of Duluth, county of St. Louis, State of Minnesota, with a branch to the point at or in the town of the States of Wisconsin and Minnesota, to a point on the Red River of the North, in the State of Minnesota, north of the eleventh standard parallel; and also to erect and operate a line or lines of telegraph between said terminal points, in connection with such railroads as it may construct.

SECOND. The time of the commencement of said corporation shall be the 1st day of August, A. D. 1881, and its continuance shall be fifty (50) years from said date.

THIRD. The amount of the capital stock of said corporation is hereby fixed and limited at the sum of five million (\$5,000,000) dollars. The said capital stock is to be paid to the treasury of said corporation upon call of the board of directors.

FOURTH. The highest amount of indebtedness or liability to which said corporation shall at any time be subject is hereby fixed and limited at the sum of five million (\$5,000,000) dollars.

FIFTH. The place of residence of the persons forming this corporation and their names, as follows: Springer Harbaugh, Cushman K. Davis, Jacob H. Stewart and Charles W. McIntyre, all residents of the city of St. Paul, in the county of Ramsey, State of Minnesota; Robert Fairweather, William Anglin and Frank Ives, who reside at Crookston, in the county of Polk, in said State, and Michael Graver and Charles Lockhart, who reside at the city of Pittsburgh, in the county of Allegheny, State of Pennsylvania.

SIXTH. The names of the first board of directors are as follows, namely: Springer Harbaugh, Cushman K. Davis, Jacob H. Stewart, Charles W. McIntyre, Robert Fairweather, William Anglin, Frank Ives, Michael Graver, and Charles Lockhart, who shall hold their office until their successors are elected and qualified.

SEVENTH. The government of the said corporation and the management of its affairs shall be vested in the following named officers: One president, one vice-president, one superintendent, one secretary, one treasurer, one general solicitor, and a board of directors consisting of nine (9) persons, including said officers, each of whom shall be stockholders in said corporation. The board of directors shall be elected by said stockholders at each year, and the officers above named shall be elected by the board of directors on the second Thursday in August in each year.

EIGHTH. The number of shares in the capital stock of said corporation is hereby fixed and limited at the sum of one hundred (100) shares, and the amount of each share is hereby fixed and limited at the sum of one hundred (\$100) dollars.
