

FIRE IN WEST ST. PAUL.
Two Frame Dwellings with Most of Their Contents Destroyed.
Between 12 and 1 o'clock last night a fire broke out in the rear of a dwelling occupied by Paul Huber, situated on Kate, formerly Fifth street, in West St. Paul. An alarm was sent in from box 17 and the department responded, but their services could not be utilized for the want of water. The fire burned slowly and a portion of the furniture was got out in a damaged condition. The flames soon communicated to a small frame dwelling owned and occupied by a widow named Mrs. Miller. Both houses with most of their contents were destroyed. Mrs. Miller had no insurance on either house or furniture. Her loss was about \$800, and is a very severe one to her.
The other building was owned by E. Langvin, and was worth about \$1,000. Insured. Mrs. Huber had no insurance on her furniture. There is no doubt but the fire was the work of an incendiary, and the supposed firebug is known, and it is to be hoped will be arrested and receive the punishment justly due him.
