

ST. PAUL STATEMEN STILL BACKWARD ABOUT COMING FORWARD.

Morgan Has Declined the Treasuryship—Conkling Now Believed to be the Man—Familiar Treatment of MacVeagh—The Senate Likely to Adjourn on Thursday.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.—President Arthur said at 1:30 o'clock to-day that Gov. Morgan had not yet accepted the offer of the presidency...
