The jury cases in the district court have all been disposed of. The plans for the new theatre to be erected on Sixth street are being drafted. Get your turkey dinner at the Boston Restaurant to-day for thirty-five cents. Three drunks were sent to the citadel for seven days by his honor yesterday. The expected meeting of the board of water commissioners failed to materialize yesterday. The newly elected officers of three Masonic lodges were installed in Masonic hall last evening. Madame Dunn's gang contributed something over \$100 to the city treasury yesterday. H. R. Farr will give a stereoscopic exhibition in the hall over Elliott's jewelry store this evening. The Emma Abbott company is booked for an entertainment in Louisville, Ky., on Friday evening. A smallpox sign was hung out on a house on Seventeenth street yesterday, so rumor has it. Vaccinate. Judge W. W. Wood, father of Mrs. A. G. Wilson of this city, died at his residence in Woodville, Ohio, on Tuesday. On Monday the Abbott company will return to the Academy, when Martha will be rendered at the matinee and Patience in the evening. The members of the Second Congregational church of this city sent a Christmas greeting to President Arthur. Of course he will frame it. The committee from the Grand Army of the Republic has decided to give the proposed concert in the Academy the second week in January. Andrew Lutwain pleaded guilty to a charge of keeping his saloon open Sunday in the municipal court yesterday, and paid a fine of \$10 and costs. Another full house was delighted by the rendition of Fra Diavolo by the Emma Abbott English Opera company, at the Academy of Music last night. The Christmas tree festivities of the Church of the Immaculate Conception will occur tomorrow evening, as will also those of St. Anthony's of Padua. The first wood from Minnetonka via Motor line, arrived yesterday. Five car loads were delivered at the new yard on Nicollet avenue, just beyond the city limits. There were seventeen loads of hay on the market at 9 o'clock yesterday morning. The wood and hay dealers are not so independent as they were one month ago. The annual meeting of the Mendelssohn club will occur this evening at the residence of the director. A new board of officers will be elected for the ensuing year. C. W. Hiller, a wood engraver of this city, died on Monday. The remains will be interred to-day from the residence at the corner of Washington and Fourteenth avenues south. The Standard Manufacturing company will suspend business, it requires too much of the time of the proprietors, who are prosecuting a prosperous and healthy dry goods business. A compromise has been effected between Mr. James R. Dayton and his two sons, the latter accepting the sum of \$4,500 as a settlement and the suits to recover \$2,500 each has been dismissed. Ed. Hughes, the bellenger who went to jail for ninety days in default of the payment of \$75 fine for striking an old man on the head with a lantern, has succeeded in raising his fine, and is again at large. Yesterday morning the grocery store owned by Mrs. L. Tech, at the corner of Seventh street and Fifteenth avenue south, was burned. The loss aggregates about \$2,800, upon which there is a small insurance. Tom Frazer, who stabbed Hennig in the back in a saloon row Tuesday night, has not yet been apprehended by the police. Hennig's condition is not dangerous, although the wound is savage and painful. Prof. Charles Davidson, of the Minneapolis academy, will deliver the first lecture in the Y. M. C. A. course in the parlors of the association this evening. His subject will be "English Manners and Customs." The Unitarian society of this city has leased the fine Jewish synagogue for the purpose of holding their services hereafter, paying therefor \$500 per annum. Services will be held in that elegant edifice next Sabbath. H. M. Carpenter, of the firm of Averill, Russell & Carpenter, reports the loss of a pair of mules on Monday night. He doesn't know whether they were stolen or whether they strayed, but thinks the former the probable one. During his trip to the east, Col. McCrory purchased eighteen new passenger cars for the Lyndale Motor line. Ten of the number are open or excursion cars, while the remaining eight are closed, similar, but superior, to those now in use on the road. Market hall is being entirely renovated and refitted with view to making it one of the best halls in the west for musical entertainments. A fine large "Sounding Shell" will be placed behind the stage, and other details will be arranged correspondingly. Yesterday morning Jessie Cooper who was incarcerated and held to the grand jury in default of \$700 bail, for the theft of a trunk from Lizzie Wilson, was brought before the district court upon a writ of habeas corpus. No evidence being adduced which would hold the woman, she was discharged. Yesterday morning articles of incorporation of the Church of the Immaculate Conception were filed at the office of the register of deeds. The following is a list of the incorporators: Thomas L. Grace, bishop; August Ravoux, vicar general; Rev. Father James McGrick, Anthony Kelly and P. W. Tobin. James Grant, the would-be shootist, has paid his \$25 fine and is now out threatening the parties from whom he claimed to have purchased liquor on Sunday with precipitation for keeping open on Sunday unless they come down with the dust. It looks very much like blackmail. He has not met with any success as yet. And now it appears that the purchase from J. B. Bassett the property on the river bank, north of the pump house, for the purpose of the erection of a new pump house, has not been consummated. Mr. Bassett's proposition to sell the property has not been accepted. In conjunction with a possession of Jas. W. Hill, the house may be built upon Hennepin island. At all events it looks that way. Nothing definite, however, will be known prior to the arrival of Mr. Hill in this city. A young crank known as Benjamin Franklin in the city, has published a sermon in which he calls for free distribution. It is at best a farce, in accordance with his convictions, or as a penance for his multitudinous sins, attempted a fast which should "last one year or for a longer time," but at the expiration of the thirtieth day of the fast, he was found to have eaten and lost twenty pounds of flesh, the Lord directed me to fast no more."
