FINANCIAL & COMMERCIAL.

Business on the board was rather quiet yesterday, and transactions were not numerous.

The market was strong and firm, especially in wheat and dressed hogs.

Wheat—No. 1 hard, 81c; No. 2 do \$1.25; No. 3, \$1.10; No. 4, 95c.

Corn—No. 2, old 58c offered; new 52c to 55c.

Oats—No. 2, mixed 41c; No. 3, 39c; No. 2 white 42c; No. 3, 40c.

Barley—No. 2, 55c; extra No. 3, 75c; No. 3, 65c.

Rye—No. 2, 78c.

Ground Feed—\$21.00 offered; old \$22.00 offered.

Corn Meal—\$21.00 offered.

Straw—No. 1, 1.00 offered.

Baled Hay—\$8.00 offered.

Dressed Hogs—\$7.50 bid; \$7.75 offered.

Financial and Stock Markets.

New York, Jan. 23.—Money 4 1/2 per cent., closing at 3 per cent. Prime mercantile paper @ 6 1/2 per cent. Sterling exchange, bankers' bills strong at \$4.34 1/2; on demand, \$4.38 1/2.

Governments—Steady and unchanged except for 4s and registered 4s, which are 1/2 per cent. higher.

Bonds—Railroad bonds rather heavy.

State Securities—Dull.

Stocks—Share speculation opened rather weak and 1/2 per cent. lower for the general market than the closing quotations Saturday, while Richmond and Danville was 1 per cent. higher.

The market in the early dealings declined 1/4 per cent., New Jersey Central, Chicago, Columbus & Indiana Central, and Denver & Rio Grande being most conspicuous in the downward movement. Subsequently a recovery of 1/2 per cent. took place, Chicago, Columbus & Indiana Central leading thereat, after which the market again became weak and declined 1/4 per cent., the latter for New Jersey Central, while Louisville & Nashville sold down 3/4 per cent. to 92.

Houston & Texas Central, however, advanced 1/4 per cent. to 84. Between boards the market was irregular and unsettled, but the changes in the main were fractional. Louisville & Nashville, however, advanced 2 per cent. to 94, while Denver & Rio Grande declined 1/4 per cent. to 89 1/2, and Richmond & Alleghany 1 per cent. to 29.

After the second board prices became more settled and an improvement of 1/4 per cent. was recorded, Denver & Rio Grande leading therein. In the late dealings, under a heavy pressure to sell, the market recorded a decline ranging from 1/4 to 3/4 per cent., the latter for Denver & Rio Grande, Philadelphia & Reading, Illinois Central, Texas Pacific, New York Central and Central Pacific were also prominent in the decline. The market closed weak at the lowest figures of the day.
