The State of Minnesota sold land last year to the amount of 92,513 acres, for an aggregate of \$542,785, as follows:

The most of the school lands sold are situated in Clay, Polk, Otter Tail, Marshall and Todd counties, and nearly all the other state lands sold are north of the Minnesota river.

Of the lands appertaining to the St. Paul & Manitoba railroads, all of which are in Minnesota, and most on the east side of the Red river valley, there were sold last year 201,982 acres.

Averill, of this city, and their daughter Nellie, were on one of the trains bound for Jacksonville, Florida. The general received a telegram yesterday stating they were uninjured. At the last meeting of the St. Paul city council an ordinance was adopted prohibiting the carrying of concealed weapons, except in certain cases where permission is obtained from the mayor. The first person to apply for permission was a minister of the gospel, who called on the mayor yesterday morning. He gave as a reason for the application that he had been threatened by a rough and he concluded it was best to be ready in case he should be attacked.

Upon the opening of the district court yesterday morning, inquiry was made on the part of several lawyers having criminal cases to defend, concerning the report of a small box among the prisoners in the court jail. In order to settle the matter at rest Judge Wilkin summoned Dr. Stewart before the court, and that gentleman gave it as his opinion that the man Benson was not suffering from small pox, but that the symptoms indicated the presence of chicken pox. The prisoners were there arraigned for trial. C. Miller, W. D. Paulson and Chas. Mahn, the festive trio who wound up the sewing machine raffle with a lively picnic at Turner hall about 2 o'clock Sunday morning, were up yesterday charged with being drunk and disorderly. It was shown to have been a jolly time and up to the hour of the fight they had been eating cake and drinking wine it being the latter trick that did the business. Officer O'Keefe testified to the difficulty experienced in breaking up the row and getting the men to the cooler. It took four men to get Mahn in a cell at city hall. He was fined \$15 and the other two ten bills each.
