

CITY GLOBULES.

The time for paying personal taxes expires to-day. Nearly \$30,000 was collected by the county treasurer yesterday in payment of personal taxes.

A hackman named John Tule was fined \$10 yesterday for bulldozing a colored passenger in the matter of fare.

Judge Brill filed an order yesterday appointing A. R. Walsh receiver in the case of Peter Y. Calvin against Chas. E. Stewart.

Sheriff Richter visited Shakopee yesterday to file his claim for the \$200 reward offered for the capture of Hank Keefe, the horse thief.

Poor old Tom Burke was up again yesterday on the charge of vagrancy. He was given thirty days and thanked the court for the sentence.

Adjutant General Van Cleve, yesterday received notice of the allowance of an increase of an invalid pension from \$13 to \$50 per month.

A decision was rendered by Judge Simons denying the motion to dissolve the attachment in the case of Cornelia Mackey against Geo. E. Adams.

Frank Devine, charged with snatching a \$20 gold piece from one Sealey, was before the court yesterday and discharged. There was no evidence against him.

A regular meeting of the fire commissioners was held last night, at which the usual number of accounts were audited. No business of importance was transacted.

Sunday night Nick Andrea went on a toot and while half seas over he tackled Officer McCarthy on the bridge. He was waltzed in and yesterday it cost him ten bills.

The fish commissioners on the 18th instant received from Washington 200,000 Atlantic salmon eggs, and last Thursday 25,000 landlocked salmon, all of which are now hatched out all right.

THE COMO ROAD.

A petition for the assessment of Damages. A petition was filed in the district court yesterday evening by Mr. E. S. Sanborn, on behalf of the managers of the Como Railroad company, asking for the appointment of commissioners to appraise land and assess damages for property to be taken in the construction of said railway.

The petition is very voluminous, and is accompanied by a map showing the route of the road and necessary to be used in its construction together with a detailed description of the lots. The petition sets forth that the company are engaged in building a railway and telegraph line from the corner of Fifth and Market streets in St. Paul to lot No. 8, Lake Como villas; that the interests of the public require the prosecution of said enterprise and that in order to construct the road it is necessary to have the right of way for a road bed and tracks that will be necessary to have a tract of land ten feet in width on each side from the center line of the streets and that it will be proper to appropriate for this purpose the property as described upon the plat; that it will be necessary to have a tract of twenty-five feet of land on each side of the railway where it crosses private property; that it is proposed to operate the motor by steam, pneumatic or otherwise. The land to be taken is in Rice & Irwin's corner, subdivision, Bonadas, Kuhns, Balles, Ninnings and other additions to the city of St. Paul.

Articles of Incorporation OF THE COTTAGE PARK ASSOCIATION. STATES OF MINNESOTA, COUNTY OF RAMSEY. Know all men by these presents, that we, the undersigned citizens of the city of St. Paul, county and state aforesaid, do hereby associate ourselves as incorporation under the general laws of said state, and do hereby adopt the following articles of incorporation:

FIRST. The name of said corporation shall be The Cottage Park Association.

SECOND. The principal place of business of said corporation shall be in the city of St. Paul, county and state aforesaid.

THIRD. The general nature of the business of said corporation shall be to acquire by purchase, lease and otherwise the ownership or control of real and personal property in said state, to sell or lease the same, or any part thereof, upon such terms and under such conditions and restrictions as may be stipulated, to improve and operate the same, and more particularly to buy, own, operate, sell, lease and improve all those certain pieces and parcels of land situated in said Ramsey county and described as follows: All of lot number three (3) in section twenty-three (23), town thirty (30), north of range twenty-two (22) west of fourth (4th) principal meridian, or any part thereof, and other lands adjacent thereto, to construct, build, operate, improve, sell and lease hotels, dwellings, boarding and club houses and other buildings, docks, wharves, bridges, streets and roads leading to, from, over and across the property owned or controlled by the said corporation, also to construct and maintain proper systems of sewerage, gas and water works.

FOURTH. The time of commencement of the business of said corporation shall be the twentieth day of February, A. D. 1882, and the same shall continue for a period of thirty (30) years from and after said date.

FIFTH. The amount of the capital stock of said corporation shall be Twenty Five Thousand Dollars, to be divided into Five Hundred Shares of Fifty Dollars each, to be paid for upon the call of the Board of Directors.

SIXTH. The highest amount of indebtedness for which said corporation shall be liable at any time is fixed at Five Thousand (\$5,000) Dollars.

SEVENTH. The government of said corporation and the management of its affairs shall be vested in a Board of Five Directors, a President, a Vice President, a Secretary and a Treasurer. The Board of Directors shall be elected annually at the annual stockholders meeting, to be held on the second Monday of October of every year, and the said officers shall be elected annually by the Board of Directors, immediately after the annual stockholders meeting.

The following named persons shall constitute the first Board of Directors: James Middleton, William Dawson, William Lindke, J. H. Saunders and Ferdinand Willius.
