GUITEAU GAINING.

TWO OF THE FOUR JUDGES FAVOR GRANTING A NEW TRIAL.

Another Argument to be Offered—Mrs. Garfield's Gratitude to the Nation—A Woman Suffrage Amendment to the Constitution—Senator Mitchell's Views on the Pennsylvania State Nominations—House of Representatives—General Capital News

Washington, May 13.—The four judges before whom the bill of exceptions in the Guiteau case was argued were in consultation six hours to-day, trying to reach a decision. It is said they failed and the court is equally divided, and another argument will be ordered before the judges.

Another consultation, however, will take place, and efforts will be made to harmonize the views of the four judges and secure a decision if possible.

Washington, May 13.—The senate select committee on women's suffrage, by a vote of three to two agreed to recommend to the senate for adoption Senator Lapham's joint resolution proposing the following amendment to the constitution:

Article XVI, Section 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex.

Sec. 2.—Congress shall have the power by appropriate legislation to enforce the provisions of this article.

The vote was, Ayes—Lapham, Blair and Jackson—3. Noes—George and Fair—3. Absent, Anthony and Ferry.

A MEMORIAL WINDOW TO RALEIGH. LONDON, May 13.—A memorial window presented by Americans to St. Margaret's church, Westminster, will be unveiled Sunday. Canon Farrar will preach the sermon.

On and after Monday, May 22, cable tariffs from New York and Canada to the United Kingdom, France and Germany will be increased to 50c per word.

LONDON, May 13.—Forster, in a speech last night, approved the repression bill and said the confidence of the liberal party in Gladstone was unabated.

O'DONNELL'S MOTION. O'Donnell's motion, to be offered on the second reading of the repression bill, will also declare the bill a fatal obstacle to order and tranquility.

REWARDS FOR INFORMATION. DUBLIN, May 13.—The government has issued a special proclamation, offering a reward of £500 for information leading to the arrest of any one laboring the assassins of Cavendish and Burke, or assisting in their escape.

THE POLICE DESPAIR. THE man arrested on suspicion of being the driver of the assassins car has been discharged. The police are becoming despondent of securing the assassin.

THE MESSES TIGHTENING. CORK, May 13.—The government is in possession of information leading to important revelations, three men having been arrested here.

DUBLIN, May 13.—The police have found out that the name of the man who drove the car containing the murderers is Ross.

FIRE PROTECTION.

Minnesota Fire Insurance Report. Part one of the eleventh annual report of the Minnesota insurance department opens with a historic sketch of the department since its organization in 1873.

Commencing with 1873 and ending with 1881, we have a period of ten years. The insurance business transacted in the said period has been published in the annual reports of this department, with the most particularity. The totals of this business, year by year, are given in the following table, and show

Table with 5 columns: Year, Total Premiums, Total Losses, Total Claims, and Average. Data for years 1873-1881.

It will be noticed that from 1873 to 1879, inclusive, the increase of risks written from year to year was gradual and comparatively even. Then comes 1880, with an increase of over a million dollars.

The growing interest in fire insurance, an unusual rivalry among the insurance companies for business, and second the general prosperity. A culmination of prosperous events and business enterprises covering a period of two or three years.

Consider, therefore, the growth and development of our agriculture, commercial and manufacturing interests, including railroads, and other important enterprises, largely the product of the ten years last past.

The commissioner shows that the per cent. of profit on business in Minnesota last year, allowing thirty per cent. expenses, was 6.8 per cent. in other words, \$202,497 was the clear profit of the companies on Minnesota business in 1881.

The following additional extracts from Mr. McGill's report may be found of interest by a number of our readers.

Another heavy loss, by fire and explosion, occurred among the mills at Minneapolis in December last, entailing losses upon the insurance companies, amounting to \$335,168.72. This is the second disaster of the kind, the first occurring in May, 1878, when the loss to the insurance companies in that case amounting to \$409,159.

The following increase of capital during 1881 is noted among the companies: So large an increase as four and one-half millions in one year would indicate a very high confidence of capital in a business of which it has generally been considered timid.
