

CITY GLOBULES.

The electric light in the park was not in operation last night. Young Bruce, who was arrested for assaulting Officer O'Keefe, was released on \$750 bail yesterday.

The rain last night prevented the concert of the Great Western band at Rice park from being given. Rev. L. C. Barnes, pastor of the First Baptist church, terminates his pulpit labors in that church to-day.

A special train for Elmo will leave the union depot at 2 p. m. to-day. Returning it will leave the lake at 7:30 p. m.

The gospel temperance meeting at Market hall this evening will be addressed by Rev. Theodore L. Kuyler, of Brooklyn.

Chief of Police Weber yesterday received from the St. Paul board of trade \$108 for Mrs. O'Connell, the widow of the murdered policeman.

Sheriff Richter and his assistants hunted through the jail yesterday to see what they could, and discovered hid away two or three saws and some files.

John Randall, who was before United States Commissioner Cardozo yesterday on a charge of selling liquor to Indians, furnished bonds to the amount of \$200 and was released.

In accordance with the orders of the mayor, all beer wagons going around the streets after 8 o'clock to-day, for the purpose of gathering up empty beer kegs, will be stopped and the drivers arrested.

In the case of the State vs. Matteson the evidence offered in relation to the guilt of the defendant being insufficient in the opinion of the court to justify the holding of Matteson he was accordingly discharged.

About 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon an oil stove in State Treasurer Kittelson's house, on Somerset street, burst, but some men who happened to be near went into the house and threw the stove out before any damage was done.

A tramp, who gave his name as John Burns, was arrested yesterday afternoon by Officer Nugent on a charge of stealing. He had in his possession several pieces of brass that evidently belonged to some machine shop and which he pretended he bought of a boy.

Between 11 and 12 o'clock last night the attention of Officer Distler was attracted by the cries of a man near the German Catholic church. He ran to the spot and arrested a young man by the name of Maurice Roach, who, together with a pal (according to the assertions of a drunken printer) by the name of Burdick, had robbed him of some \$3.

Roach was locked up at 1 a. m. Officer O'Keefe arrested Burdick in the Sixth ward for drunkenness, and he also is in the lockup. The story will be told to-morrow to Judge Burr.

Frank Sterrett, Esq., returned home yesterday morning from a week's sojourn in the Red river valley, during which time he took occasion to make a thorough examination of the wheat fields in that region. He says that the wheat crop north of Crookston to the Canada line never looked better. The straw is of good length and it is heading out splendidly.

South of Crookston the straw is shorter, but healthy. Altogether Mr. Sterrett gives it as his opinion that the yield will be equal to any former year.
