

The City Water Works. Yesterday the transfer of the water works of the St. Paul Water company was made to the city of St. Paul, and the papers were placed on record. The recorded papers consist of a bill of sale of the water company to the city of St. Paul, and of the personal property and deeds of all the land and rights to flow land in Washington and Ramsey counties that are subject to flowage. The business of transferring was done at the First National bank. All the city officers required for the occasion were present. The price paid was \$350,000, the thirty year four per cent. bonds being taken at par in payment. This fixes the title of the whole property of the Water Works company in the city of St. Paul. Tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock the first meeting of the board of water commissioners, consisting of P. H. Kelly, G. W. Griggs, C. A. Bostwick, C. D. Gilliland and Mayor Rice, will be held at the office of the Water company, on Fifth street just below Wabasha street.
