Thinking over the Tariff. [Boston, Aug. 25.—The tariff commission was addressed by Ed. Larkins, of Boston, on the sugar importing interests. He favored a reduction in the tariff on sugar because the consumers would thus get it at a reduced price. The increase of consumption would remove the temptation to adulterate and eventually induce Spain from coming and good feeling to reduce her duty on an article exported to America.]

Thomas, president of the Standard Sugar company, of Boston, endorsed the views of the last speaker and said his company asked for a law which will not discriminate against the importation of low priced sugar. D. Townsend, of the Continental company, of Boston, advocated an ad valorem duty. The present law, he believed, discriminated in favor of certain classes, notably those on the Pacific coast, as against the East. This is partially due to the Hawaiian commission. Adjourned until to-morrow.

Arthur's Vacation. [NEWPORT, R. I., Aug. 25.—The dinner given to President Arthur to-night by ex-Gov. Morgan of New York, was a brilliant and select affair. Only a few personal friends were invited. The president met many guests at the reception given by Chas. H. Russell, of New York. Over 300 people were present. Later in the evening the president attended a party given by Commodore Baldwin, of the United States navy, at his villa. The ball was one of the most elegant affairs ever given here, the elite of the summer residents being present. The president attended to considerable business early in the day, and to-morrow will visit Coaster's Island harbor in company with the secretary of the navy. He will also visit the polo grounds, attend a fete champetre, dine with John Jacob Astor in the evening.]

Her husband had been watching her for several days. It is supposed he was fatigued and fell asleep when she cut his throat from ear to ear. No daughters hearing noise went to the room and found the door locked and their lives were threatened if they broke in. They called assistance and secured the murderers.]

Agitates. [SARATOGA, Aug. 25.—A professional and amateur sculling and rowing race, mile and a half and return, took place at Saratoga Lake to-day. The amateur took place first. Starters: A. Kirby, Pawtucket, R. I.; Chas. E. Bulger, Albany, N. Y.; Jas. Pilkinton, New York; R. A. Dempsey, Philadelphia, and Frank Holmes, Pawtucket. The race was won by Holmes, eight lengths in front of Kirby, Dempsey next, followed by Pilkinton, Bulger a third of a mile further in the rear. The winners time was 21 minutes, 16 1/2 seconds.
