RIVER AND RAIL.

A part of several families from Sweden direct, left yesterday for Kennedy, Kittson county, in the Red river valley.

The Jerome Marble hunting car, with the hunters on board that has been out in Dakota, returned yesterday and went up on the Northern Pacific.

O. W. Ruggles, general passenger agent of the Michigan Central road and Mr. Bsenbark, general traveling agent of the same left for Winnipeg last night.

The Chicago, St. Paul and Omaha road had sent out the train for Chicago last night, in two large sections, to accommodate the people who are going from Manitoba on the great Canadian excursion.

The regular fall exodus from the new Northwest, to Europe, has already set in, and during the past few days many prominent settlers from the Red river valley, have passed through St. Paul, en route to their old homes across the sea where they will spend the winter and return in the spring with relatives and friends.

The river shows 3 feet 6 inches on the bar. The Josie of the Diamond Jo line will leave some time to-day.

The Alex Kemball, of the Davidson electric light line, will leave at 10 o'clock this morning. The Kemball is an elegant steamer and one of the most charming on the river to take a trip on. She is fitted up in a most luxurious style.

The city treasurer yesterday received \$6,061.74 worth of canceled coupons from New York.

The following delegates will represent St. Paul in the executive board of the German Catholic Mutual Aid society which meets at Milwaukee on the 20th, at Koch, St. Peter society; Peter Laeskies, St. Clement society, and R. Rolfe, St. Leo society.

The first ward permanent Democratic club met last evening at the Merchants, and elected the following officers for the ensuing year: President, T. C. Swenson; secretary, H. W. Cory; first vice president, Col. Crooks; second vice president, Col. Allen; treasurer, M. Lyons.

A man pretty well along in years, who gave his name as J. S. Hudson, who has lived for twenty-eight years in Texas, arrived in St. Paul yesterday without money. He appeared at the city hall and said he wanted to go to the hospital. He has been living at Laverne for the last three months.

A dead was recorded yesterday from Seraphine E. Willoughby to Robert Hager, conveying fifty feet on the north side of Sixth street, between Jackson and Robert, for \$10,000; also one from D. D. Merrill to Charles S. Williams, conveying a piece of property between Broadway, Grove and Twelfth streets, for \$16,400.

A very small audience witnessed a very good representation of the social drama of "Oudarde" at the Opera house last evening. The threatening state of the weather no doubt had its effect in preventing many from venturing out. Notwithstanding the small audience the members of the company exerted themselves to please those who were present, and they succeeded.

An interesting race against time took place yesterday afternoon upon the Midway track, upon a wager of \$50, that O. G. Miller's brown gelding could not make a mile in three minutes. While there was no dispute among the judges that the horse went within a mile in three minutes, there was some doubt as to whether he made the mile in three minutes, and the result of the wager is left to a board of arbitration.

Godfrey's Spread Eagle saloon, No. 410 Jackson street, near Seventh, was burglarized during Monday night. The burglars effected an entrance by breaking a window in the rear of the building, admitting them into the basement, from whence they robbed their way to the saloon, where they made off with the money drawer of some \$20, and helped themselves to several bottles of wine, cigars etc. It is barely possible that the guilty men may escape.
