Gardner in Karl.

A large and well pleased audience greeted Mr. Charles A. Gardner and his excellent company at the Opera house last evening. The Ramsey County Republicans.

The Republican county committee (regular so called) met at the office of Gen. Mark D. Flower in the custom house yesterday afternoon, every member of the committee being present as follows: Mark D. Flower chairman, J. P. Allen, A. N. Nelson, R. N. McLaren, Ernest Albrecht, Geo. Watson and Peter Bohland. The committee talked over the situation generally, and decided upon the apportionment of delegates.
