Judge Simons filed a decree yesterday in the case of L. Fletcher & Co. vs. John Jarvis, finding for the plaintiff for \$65 and costs and disbursements.

Judge Wilkin filed an order yesterday in the case of Robert J. Diamond against Susan J. McKinney, granting the motion to strike out certain portions of the answer, in the suit to set aside certain deeds made by plaintiff to defendant when living together as man and wife.

Charles P. Daly and wife, of New York, have sold to Charles A. Moore and F. B. Farwell 74 acres in the E 1/2 of N. W. 1/4, section 3, town 28, range 24, for \$29,820.

A slight railroad accident took place near the Lake Elmo station, yesterday morning. The regular eastern express ran into a freight train which was standing on the track, and both engines were more or less damaged.

The electric light on bridge square was put in working order last night, and for the first time lighted up. It is presumed that it will work better hereafter than it did last night.

Articles of incorporation of the Mutual Aid society of the Methodist annual conference of the Methodist Episcopal church were filed with the secretary of state yesterday. The office and principal place of business is to be Minneapolis.

The request of J. P. Gribben and others for the vacation of an alley north of block one of Hill's addition to the city of St. Paul, was referred to the committee on streets.

The communication of O. O. Callen and others, asking to be allowed something for the sewer they built on Fourth street some years ago, and that they be credited the amount so allowed on the new sewer, was referred to the committee.

An order is to be drawn upon the treasury for \$300 in favor of Byer & Lax. The award to John Doherty of the contract for constructing a sewer on Fourth street from a point fifty feet east of Robert street to Jackson street, was confirmed.

The awarding to M. B. Farrell the contract for stone gutters on Minnesota street from Fifth to Seventh street was confirmed.

The council disallowed the application of John Hamilton for damages for injuries said to have been received on the bridge at Phalen's creek.

The committee on streets was directed to report as to the necessity of having the street names posted along the streets; also such plan or method as in their opinion will best accomplish the purpose; also an approximate estimate of the number of signs required and their cost; also a proper order directing the work to be done.

J. A. Sabin is allowed to move a building from Grove street to Thirteenth street. It was decided to require the street railway company to fix certain cross-walks.

The grade of Jackson street from Arch to Minnehaha was adopted. The board of public works was directed to investigate and report as to a change of grade on George street, from Stryker avenue to Charleston street.

LAST SAD RITES.

Funeral of the Late Edward Rotter Today—Action of Ramsey County Bar.

Resolved, That in his death we lose an example of high bred qualities, of firm, manly and moral courage, and of honesty and integrity, both in professional and private life.

Resolved, That the members of this bar attend the funeral of Mr. Rotter, and that we tender to his friends and relatives our sincere sympathy.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be forwarded to the family of the deceased.

Mr. A. S. Hall seconded the resolutions with a few feeling remarks, and was followed by Mr. J. J. Egan who paid an eloquent tribute to the many manly and genial qualities of the deceased.

A committee was appointed by the chair, consisting of Messrs Egan, Rutherford and Goforth, to arrange for attending the funeral to-day, and Messrs Goforth and Morrison were selected to represent the bar as pall-bearers.

The meeting then adjourned.

A CURIOUS CASE. Two Young Girls Run Away From St. Cloud With Two Men—Three of the Parties are Arrested—The Father of One of the Girls Appears.

A dispatch was received yesterday from St. Cloud to arrest a party of runaways, consisting of two girls, one seventeen and the other fifteen years of age, each accompanied by a man. The matter was placed in Officer Kennealy's hands, who started on a hunt for them, and found three of the party—the two girls and one of the men—at the International hotel. The other man could not be found. The three were taken to the city hall and locked up. The man gave his name as Harris Gerhardt, and claims that he was to marry the fifteen year old girl. They left St. Cloud Monday afternoon to go to Galesburg, Ill., where the marriage ceremony was to take place. They stopped at the International where they met Gerhardt with Emma Hart, the fifteen year old girl and his intended wife sat up all night with Miss Ella Porter, the other girl, who it is claimed was quite ill. It is said that both girls are members of good families, and are good looking, well appearing children. They remained at the city hall all night, when the father of the Hart girl arrived in town and took both of them away. There will probably be a hearing this morning in the municipal court.

A Big Auction Sale. P. T. Kavanagh, the auctioneer, sold under the hammer yesterday afternoon, the whole of Watson & Rice's subdivision of block 1, Stinson, Brown & Ramsey's addition. This property consisted of fifty-six lots, unimproved, on Fort and adjacent streets immediately east of the short line crossing. The day was rather raw, but the attendance was quite large, and prices ranged from \$340 to \$1,345 per lot, all of which were sold. The total amount realized was \$31,610. This is the largest single auction sale of real estate made in the city of St. Paul in the past ten years.
